

MAN GRANTED BOND TO FACE TRIAL IN MERCHANT'S DEATH

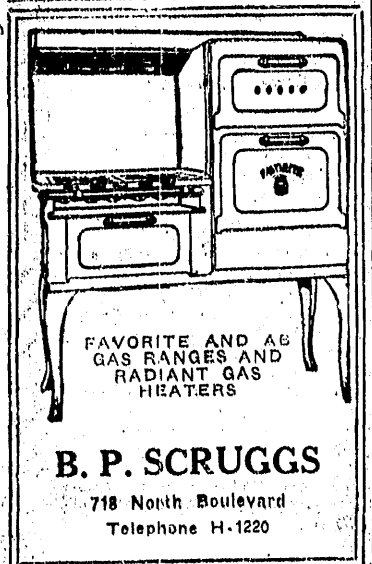

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GO-OPERATIVE FARMS STARTED IN FLORIDA

400 Northern Settlers Buy 10,000 Acres for Project Near Okeechobee

OKEECHOBEE, Dec. 29.—(A.P.)—A migration to Florida, strongly different from those when the nation was young, is being made by farmer descendants of Swedish and German residents of Ohio, Wisconsin and Iowa. Four hundred of them have purchased 10,000 acres near here and 40 families are said to be on their way to clear the land.

The manner of their coming, contrasted with the mode of travel of their ancestors, is a commentary on the nation's progress. Not by stage and covered wagon and overland trail, braving the dangers of a hostile people, do they change their abode, nor will they find their destination, the wilderness their forefathers might have witnessed. In ease and comfort, with modern machinery at their bidding, they plan to accomplish in a few years that which to their forebears would have been the work of a lifetime.

ONE MAN IS KILLED, ANOTHER WOUNDED IN FIGHT OVER DRY LAW

OFFICER-ELECT CUT WITH SHOVEL TO BE GIVEN HEARING TODAY

Three Witnesses See Battle in Woods As Result of Liquor Argument

PUNTA GORDA, Dec. 29.—(Tribune News Service.)—Preliminary trial of Judd Matthews, charged with the murder of Aaron Spivey, was set today for tomorrow by Judge W. R. Roberts. The hearing was ordered after the death of Spivey, who was shot Saturday afternoon when he and Matthews are said to have engaged in a combat in the woods nine miles north of here as the result of an old quarrel.

There were three eye-witnesses to the fray, George Rawls, brother-in-law of Matthews, Robert Goff and George Raymond, all of this city. Matthews was elected constable for his district in November and was to have taken office Jan. 1. He had previously charged Spivey with handling liquor, and had recently communicated directly with the governor regarding inability to have liquor laws enforced. The governor asked for a report on the complaint from Sheriff J. H. Lipscomb.

Spivey and Matthews met Saturday on a woods road. The three witnesses said the men started fighting after a short argument. Spivey, armed with a shovel, Matthews with a revolver, Matthews suffered a deep gash in the head. Matthews came to Punta Gorda immediately and reported the affair and surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Blizack. Spivey was taken to the Arcadia hospital, where he died the next day. He is survived by a wife and several children.

HUGE LIQUOR PLANT CAPTURED IN WOODS NEAR JACKSONVILLE

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 29.—(A.P.)—Federal prohibition agents from the headquarters office here captured and destroyed a liquor plant of capacity comparable to that of the licensed distilleries of the state. Two white men and a negro made their escape as the federal agents closed in on the plant in the woods, 18 miles southwest of the city. The plant, which covered about the space of a city block, was equipped with a battery of three 750-gallon stills, with a daily capacity of about 800 gallons of liquor. The agents destroyed 1,500 gallons of the finished product and 30,000 gallons of mash and made a bonfire of the other equipment.

BAPTIST ASSEMBLY BUILDINGS RUSHED FOR WINTER MEET

CLERMONT, Dec. 29.—(Tribune News Service.)—The rapid progress in the construction of the new Baptist assembly at Clermont is attracting wide attention in this section. It has been only two weeks since the contract was let for the erection of the auditorium, restaurant and cafeteria buildings, and already the latter two are under cover and work on the auditorium would be as far advanced except for the delay in a shipment of crushed rock for the pouring of the foundation walls. J. E. Burns, of DeLand, is the contractor and he is making every effort to have all the buildings ready for occupancy by Feb. 15. At one end of the restaurant and cafeteria building, which is 50 by 70 feet, there is a unit which will house the general offices of the assembly. It is the plan of the Southern Baptist Educational board to hold the first sessions of the assembly late in February and thousands of Baptists from the southern states are expected.

SCOUT TROOP OPENS CAMP AT POLK CITY

POLK CITY, Dec. 29.—(Tribune News Service.)—More than 50 first class Boy Scouts from Lakeland, with their leaders, opened a three-day camp at Clearwater Lake, near here, yesterday, at summer headquarters of the Lakeland council. The camp was planned to allow the boys to spend their winter in exercising and camping, as the surroundings of the camp have been declared ideal for that purpose. Each boy will provide his own provisions for the three days, and each will prepare his own meals and provide his own shelter. Thursday afternoon, the last day in camp, the court of honor will meet, and merit badges will be awarded to the scouts who have won them in any line of work during December.

BOOTHS DISTRIBUTED AT ORANGE FESTIVAL

WINTER HAVEN, Dec. 29.—(Tribune News Service.)—Twenty men, divided into squads of two each, are canvassing South Florida to distribute booth space at the Polk County Orange Festival, Jan. 20, 21 and 22. Fifty of the spaces have been sold already without solicitation.

CHAMBER AT ARCADIA BOOSTS NEW CANNERY

Growers Urged to Plant More Tomatoes and Vegetable Platform Is Sought

ARCADIA, Dec. 29.—(Tribune News Service.)—The DeSoto Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a "grapefruit day" on the opening of the new grapefruit cannery here. Every citizen of the county will be asked to buy a can of the grapefruit from the new packing plant.

The chamber heard a discussion on planting and shipping tomatoes and Harley Watson was appointed to head a committee to obtain the construction of a vegetable platform. Shelby Hollingsworth spoke on the need of an improved pack and how better prices can be obtained if vegetables are handled by a packing house with a standard grade. The growers will be urged to plant a large acreage of tomatoes. Simon Rosin was appointed chairman of a committee to raise funds for the Verna Holt-Arcadia center for the formal inauguration of Hamilton Holt, Litt. D., LL.D., as president of Rollins college.

HAINES CITY LIONS HEAR CITRUS FACTS

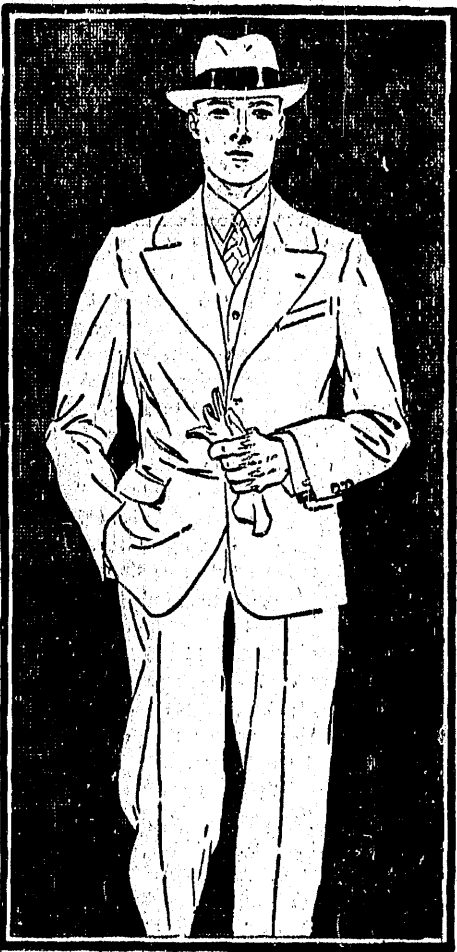

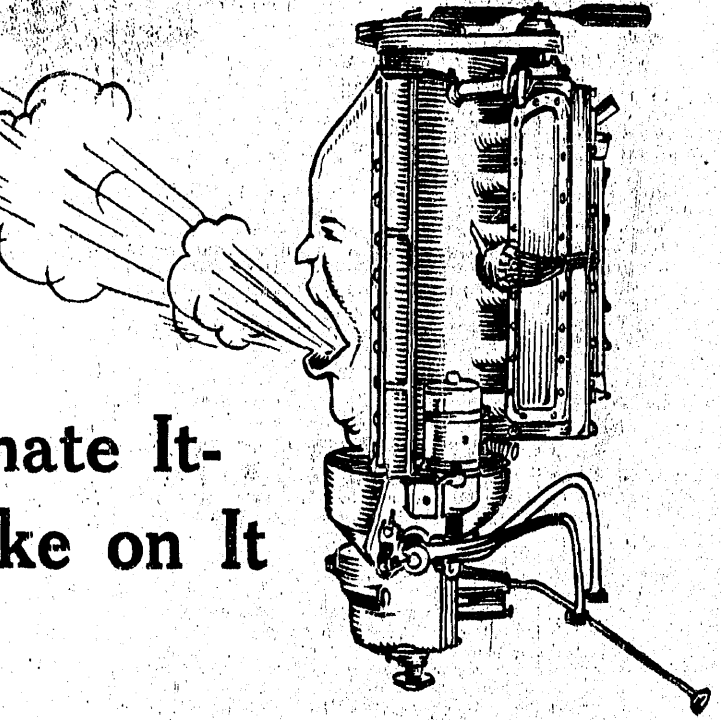

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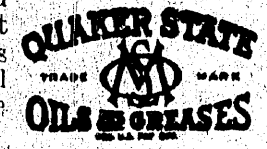
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
