

COUNTY HANDLES OWN TUBERCULOSIS WORK

RENOUNCES THE STATE ASSOCIATION

Funds for General Work Says Hixon, Not for One County Only

Renouncing the Florida Public Health Association and all its works, the Hillsborough County Tuberculosis Association yesterday sovered its connection with the state organization and voted to handle its own tubercular relief work in its own way. The decision came after a somewhat strained meeting between the local association and officers from the Jacksonville headquarters of the state organization who came here for the purpose of giving an accounting of funds received from this county. The joint meeting was the result of efforts made by the American Logion to determine what had become of the money collected by the state association in December, 1921, through the sale of Christmas seals in Hillsborough county. It was reported that \$10,000 had been realized in this fashion, and that the county was far from getting value received for any part of this sum.

It was brought out that the traveling clinic had to date examined only about 1,000 patients in the state, and had discovered only 117 tubercular cases among those. W. F. Barnwell, manager of the Quarter Million Club, as well as chairman of the American Legion investigating committee, using the figures of the state association's assets for 1921 as a basis, declared that the \$34,000 listed there was a high price to pay for discovering 117 tubercular patients, while the Tampa clinic, under Dr. Higgins, treated more than eighty each wook, without any funds. President Kaplan, said that the state association was also doing a great work in a health crusade ambng the state's schools, which was of inestimable value in the prevention of discase. Two chauffeurs, Mateo and Betta, now under arrest, are said to have stated that they drove the Chinamen in cars to the place where there were located near Devil's island, and that McFall and Adams proceded them to point out the road. The chauffours are being held as material witnesses, and will probably not be prosecuted, in order that their evidence may be available.

Constable McFall has protested his innocence of the smuggling charge, declaring ha was himself making investigations preparatory to making arrests in the case. He and Adams are under bond of \$2,000.

McFall was arrested on a similar charge about a month ago, but was released at his preliminary hearing when immigration officers unnounced they were not prepared at the time to continue with the case. Mrs. De-Witt Adams was arrested a year or more ago charged with harboring Chinamen in her home, and was convicted by a federal jury.

Immigration Inspector Whalen, who has been assisted in working up the case by members of the city police force and detective force, is understood to have the case practically complete.



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
