# Okeechobee Case

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 13 .- (Assoprotect the county's funds.

The opinion was in a case brought against the Detroit Fidelity & Insurance company by Doyle E. Carlton, while governor, for the benefit and use of Okeachobee county.

The suit was to collect \$2000 surety bond which the company executed for W. W. Potter as a county commissioner of Okeechobee county Carlton contended Potter was guilty of "violation of his official duty" in connection with security for a deposit of \$500,000 funds from an Okeechobee county road bond issue.

Proceeds from the bond issue were deposited in the People's Bank of Okeechobee and re-deposited in the Florida National bank of Jacksonville. Government bonds totaling \$300,000 were put up as collateral, and agreement was made that as withdrawals were made from the fund, corresponding withdrawals of collateral security could be made by the

Carlton charged that Potter and other county commissioners approved withdrawal of securities in excess of the amount necessary to protect debank of Okeechobee closed June 5, 1929, there remained only \$10,000 of security for the deposit then totaling \$91,361 and that the county lost the balance. A lower court held the bonding company was not liable.

#### Tax Payment With Bonds Halted at St. Petersburg

OLEARWATER, Nov. 13 .- (Special.) -A temporary order enjoining the city of St. Petersburg from accepting bonds or interest coupons in settlement of 1931 taxes was issued by Circuit Judge T. Frank Hobson today upon petition of Edward Walker, St. Petersburg taxpayer.

The petition set up that bond payment of delinquent taxes, as contemplated by the city council, would be illegal, unfair to property owners who have already paid in cash, and detrimental to the city in that it would "encourage non-payment of taxes."

### Would Bar Schedule Compensation Rating

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—(A.P.)—The national council on compensation insurance notified its member companies today that it is filing a proposal with authorities and independent boards and bureaus of regulated states to eliminate schedule rating in workmen's compensation risks.

Simultaneously it announced that schedule rating will cease on Dec. 31 in the jurisdiction of Louisiana, under ts local administrative bureaus, The ruling also becomes effective in Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi and South Carolina where employers liability laws still prevail.


