KEY WEST, Fla., April 2 .- A. P. Jeruson, of North Beach and Petronia street, who has a farm on Sugar Loaf, said today that, due to a lack of rain during the last three months, the sun ourned up three acres of cucumbers he

burned up three acres of cucumbers he had planted on that key. The last time he was at Sugar loaf, Mr. Jerguson added, there were not half a dozen plants of the entire three acres that showed any signs of Hfe.

During that same day, Mr. Jerguson said, there was a heavy rainfall on Caleb Baker's farm, a few hundred yards away, so heavy that part, of his tract was flooded, but that not a drop fell on his, Mr. Jerguson's acreage.

Mr. Jerguson said that he was not troubled in the least by bugs or worms because of a method he has adopted in growing cucumbers; and he expects that, with earlier planting next fall, so that he will get the benefit of therainy season, he will be able to raise immense crops. His style is to plant one row of cucumbers for crop purposes and another row to feed bugs and worms. He sprays the plants from which he expects to exther cucumbers.

Mr. Jerguson declared that his method has never falled him and has worked so successfully that scarcely a leaf of the valued vines has been eaten by a bug or worm.
