PLANTS ONE ROW FOR CROP, ONE FOR WORMS

Sugar Loaf Key Farmer Has Unique Method of Baiting Cucumber Parasites.

Jerguson, of North Beach and Petronia street, who has a farm on Sugar Loaf, said today that due to a lack of rain during the last three months, the sun burned up three acres of cucumbers he had planted on that key. "The last time he was at Sugar Loaf, Mr. Jerguson said, there was a heavy rainfall on Calab Baker's farm, a few hundred yards away, so heavy that part of his tract was flooded, but that not a drop fell on his, Mr. Jerguson's acreage. Mr. Jerguson said that he was not troubled in the least by bugs or worms because of a method he has adopted in growing cucumbers, and he expects that, with earlier planting next fall, so that he will get the benefit of the rainy season, he will be able to raise immense crops. His style is to plant one row of cucumbers for crop purposes and another row to feed bugs and worms. He sprays the plants from which he expects to gather cucumbers, while the alternating one he leaves in its natural state, so that bugs will continue to feed on it and not eat the bitter leaves of the vines that have been sprayed. Just about the time the bugs are thickest on the vines that are used as "bait," Mr. Jerguson explained, he uses a spray that almost instantly kills them and their eggs, hoes out the vines and burns them up. Then fresh vines are planted as "bait."

CONNORS SOON TO BUILD HOMES AT OKEECHOBEE

Planning Several Hundred; Bank Also to Erect New Structure; Toll Road Progressing.

Connors, who has recently purchased 3,800 city lots within the corporate limits of Okeechobee, likewise 12,000 acres near the town, and several miles of lake front, announces that he will soon begin the erection of several hundred residences in Okeechobee, likewise several business blocks. He is preparing to install an immense saw and planing mill to cut the timber from his lands and build the above structures. He also states that he will build and equip one of the most modern camps here to be found in the south. As Mr. Connors will spend considerable of his future time in Okeechobee, he will at once build a home here.

W. R. Gary, cashier of the Bank of Okeechobee, announces that plans have been drawn for a new and modern bank building, also several other business houses in line with same, and that work thereon will begin at an early date. Bowden Brothers have bought a prominent corner lot and will soon begin the erection of a large garage thereon.

Members of the Primitive Baptist church have begun the erection of a nice church building near the public school building. Ellis Kinsey has begun the erection of a general store down the creek and will soon open up thereon. Work on the E. C. extension is progressing rapidly and soon we will be making points south by rail. A tremendous force is at work on the Connors toll road, and by December 1 we will have a solid road from Miami to Tampa, with Okeechobee the night stop-over going and coming.

MISS BALLARD WILL ATTEND SAN FRANCISCO CONVENTION

Palm Beach County School Superintendent on Advisory Committee for World Meet.

SPECIAL TO THE HERALD WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., April 2.—Miss Agnes Ballard, county superintendent of schools, has been honored by a request from William B. Owen, president of the National Educational association, Washington, D. C., to serve on the advisory committee for the World Conference on Education, to be held in San Francisco, June 28 to July 5. Miss Ballard had planned to attend the meeting of the National Educational association, which will be in session in Oakland, San Francisco, July 1-5. Miss Ballard will depart this morning from the state Social Welfare conference at St. Petersburg, has accepted. The advisory committee will shape the policies completing the organization for the world conference. Fifty foreign countries have been asked to send five delegates, as many alternates and other representatives. A thousand foreign professors, teaching in American colleges, and 15,000 foreign students will attend. This is the most important world-wide educational conference ever held. Miss Ruby Loranca Dean, of the high school here, also plans to accompany Miss Ballard to the two conventions.

FRENCH GILDER MAKES FLIGHT OF 15 MINUTES

PARIS, April 2.—George Barbot is reported to have remained in the air at Toulouse yesterday for a quarter of an hour in a glider equipped with a motor of seven horsepower. Barbot took off, flew and landed without the aid of a wind. Aeronautic observers proclaimed his feat the inauguration of a new era in aviation. The motorized glider used is said to be capable of reaching an elevation of 4,600 meters and a speed of 55 miles an hour, making 12 1/2 miles on one gallon of gasoline. Barbot is credited unofficially with the first glider flight in the world, a record by remaining aloft at Binkia in January for eight hours, 36 minutes, 55 seconds in an airplane with the motor dead.
