

"Other countries have glorious pasts, ours has a no less glorious future," Mr. Chase concluded. "America-lives less for her forefathers than for her children. The flag is the prod-

uct of 5,000 years of struggle upward for an equal opportunity for all men; it is that for which citizens struggled and heroes died. Stand, then, and salute when Old Glory passes; rise, then, when its anthem is played. Accord to the beauty of Voltage.

### KEY WEST STONE CRABS PLENTIFUL

KEY WEST, Fla., July 3 .- (Herald tinue to be scarce in local waters; stonecrabs are reported to be more plentiful than they have been in several months, and some of the crawfishermen are also catching crabs and find a ready market for them.

Most of the crabs are caught on the banks during low tide, at which time the crabs are found in holes and are pulled out with iron rods, one end of which is turned to serve the purposes of a hook, However, many of the crabs are caught at night while crawling over the banks. One crawfisherman said today that

while bullying for crawfish at night, he caught more crabs in his bully net than he did crawfish.

The prices for crabs are practically the same as those for crawcally the same as those for craw-fish, although the latter, at times, bring higher amounts. Large stone-crabs at present have a ready mar-ket at \$1.50 a dozen, and the prices range downward from that figure to 35 cents for the smaller crabs.
