I would not advocate ten hard games but about seven hard games and three easier contests would be O. K. In an eight-game schedule there should be two easy games and the others may

be as tough as possible.

But regardless of the number of games the athlete should be fit when play begins. He cannot reach his best form during the season unless he starts thinking about football and preparing for it while the summer sun is shining. Then when the sea-son is on he must use common sense to keep himself fit.


