REACHES STOP ON SCHEDULED TIME

Large Crowd Watches Flier Take Off From Miami Airport.

HELIUM, British Honduras, Feb. 4. Col. Charles A. Lindbergh tonight was the welcome guest of this colony, to which he was the first to introduce airplane travel little more than a year ago.

At almost the exact moment he was expected, he brought his Sikorsky amphibian plane down to a smooth landing on the harbor waters at 2:55 P. M. (GMT Western standard time.)

The route he inaugurated today is regarded as the direct outcome of the good will flight of the young aviator a year ago.

ADDITIONAL ARRESTS FOLLOW CRUSHING OF SPANIARDS' REVOLT

Newspapers Forbidden To Publish Story; Correspondents Fined.

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.) HENDAYTE, Brando-Spanish Frontier, Feb. 4.—Gen. Primo de Rivera appeared tonight to have crushed the armed revolt against his dictatorship.

Discussions, protests and manifestos are said to have taken the place of fighting, while the government is attempting down an even more rigid censorship.

CRUISER BILL TIME CLAUSE IS APPROVED

Senate Refuses To Comply With Request of President Coolidge.

BALLOT AGAINST PROPOSAL 2 TO 1

Measure Now Calls For 3 Ships Each Year Starting At Once.

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Overriding the expressed wish of President Coolidge, the senate, by a vote of 54 to 28, refused late today to eliminate from the cruiser construction bill the stipulation that the 16 ships shall be laid down before July 1, 1931.

Party lines went to smash on the proposition with a Democrat, Senator Harrison of Mississippi, offering the amendment to give the president a free rein over the naval program.

This disposed of the dominant issue in the cruiser fight and the senate adjourned to meet tomorrow when passage of the measure authorizing 15 cruisers and an airplane carrier, at a cost of \$274,000,000, is regarded as assured.

President Coolidge lost on the same issue in the house last year. Recently it was made known at the White House that if the time limitation clause were eliminated and the chief executive were given a free hand over the naval program he would send up recommendations for several of the cruisers at once.

But the senate stood by the provision requiring that work on five of the cruisers shall be started during each of the next three fiscal years beginning with this year, which ends July 1.

PALM BEACH WRANGLE RESULTS IN ARRESTS

Operator of \$8,000,000 Hotel Alba Has Trouble Over Proposed Bathing Beach.

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.) PALM BEACH, Fla., Feb. 4.—Continued efforts of S. W. Straus, New York financier and head of a hotel system which operates the Alba, \$8,000,000 local hotel, to construct a fashionable society beach on ocean front property again were interrupted late today when two workmen on the project were arrested.

Straus obtained the property in question in a recent purchase from J. Leonard Replage, Palm Beach and New York local leader.

The workmen were taken to police headquarters after others had been ordered by the policemen to stop work, but later were released without charges having been placed against them.

The officers said they had acted on orders from the town council, which had declined to grant Straus a permit for the erection of a casino and bath houses on the property.

Recently the Palm Beach art jury, an official body appointed to supervise all construction work in this noted society playground, approved the Straus plans, but turned responsibility back to the council.

WOMAN ASKS CLEMENCY

ATLANTA, Feb. 4.—More than four years after she confessed murder and accepted a life prison term, Mrs. Nora E. Duren brought a petition for pardon in which she set out that she is innocent, it was revealed by the prison commission today.

SENTPENCED TO DEATH. LIVERPOOL, England, Feb. 4.—Joseph Reginald V. Clarke, 21, former Princeton university student, was sentenced to death today for the murder of Mrs. Alice Fontaine, 47, whose daughter was believed to have been a victim of Clarke's hypnotic powers.

KILLER OF GIRL GIVES HIMSELF UP

Tells of Failure To Take Own Life In Suicide Pact.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 4. (AP)—Safe behind the bars where remorse over his crime had driven him, Harvey Leo Selhaver, 35, tonight was awaiting the legal action which will take him back to Kingston, N. J., to stand trial for the murder of his 16-year-old sweetheart, more than four years ago.

Selhaver appeared in the police station late last night, worn and haggard, and anxious to unburden himself of the secret which has weighed upon him since August 4, 1924, when he shot and killed Sarah Elizabeth Johnson, daughter of a farmer who had refused permission for him to marry the girl.

Selhaver had been a farm hand in the home of Joseph A. Johnson, of Aqueduct, a small settlement near Kingston. When Johnson tried to end the romance of Selhaver and the girl, the pair had many secret meetings and finally formulated a suicide pact.

After shooting the girl with a 22 calibre weapon, Selhaver lacked the courage to kill himself, and although he stayed with the body of his dead sweetheart for four days, he then disappeared, leaving a note hinting at suicide.

STANDARD OIL VOTES EXTRA STOCK AWARD AND CASH DIVIDEND

Regarded As Clever Coup By Stewart In Fight With Rockefeller.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Directors of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana today voted an extra dividend of 70 per cent in stock and 50 cents in cash to stockholders of record February 16.

The action was construed in financial circles of Chicago and New York as a clever coup in the fight between the Col. Robert W. Stewart, board chairman, and John D. Rockefeller, Jr., for control of the company.

The liberal award to the stockholders, it was believed would have the effect of establishing confidence in the directorship of Colonel Stewart, which has been under fire from Rockefeller ever since the board chairman was involved in the senate investigation of the Teapot Dome oil lease scandal.

A statement from the offices of the Standard Oil Company late today, however, said that the action of the board was taken on the basis of surplus on hand and the prospects for the future and had no bearing on the proxy fight.

OBJECTIONS MADE TO SHOALS LEASE

Fertilizer Companies Protest To House Committee.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Efforts of the American Cyanamid Company to lease Moose Shoals from the government, met stiff objection from private fertilizer companies today.

Charles J. Brand, appearing before the house military affairs committee on behalf of the National Fertilizer Association, registered that group of manufacturers as emphatically opposed to the Cyanamid company's bid.

OHIO OFFICIAL NOW IS FACING IMPEACHMENT

Proceedings Are Instituted Against B. B. Buckley, State Treasurer.

FOUND GUILTY OF BRIBERY CHARGES

Conviction Also Covered Dry Law.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 4.—At the request of Gov. Meyer Y. Cooper, the house of representatives tonight instituted impeachment proceedings against State Treasurer Bert B. Buckley, who was convicted in Federal court Saturday of attempted bribery and conspiracy to violate the national prohibition law.

The action followed Buckley's refusal to resign, pending the outcome of a motion for a new trial filed by his attorneys in Federal court today.

Before the house went into its evening session, Governor Cooper held a conference with members of his cabinet and legislative leaders and later served notice on the treasurer that unless his resignation was received by 7 o'clock the matter would be taken before the legislature.

At the appointed hour, the governor had received no word from Buckley. He sent his message to the house promptly at 7 o'clock and immediately after it was read Arthur Hamilton, majority leader, introduced a resolution calling for appointment of a committee to investigate Buckley's conviction with a view to bringing impeachment proceedings.

The resolution was adopted unanimously without debate.

Speaker G. C. Gray announced that he will appoint the investigating committee tomorrow morning, and then will get under way what Ohio historians say is the first impeachment case ever instituted in this state against one of its officials.

While Buckley personally took no heed of the governor's ultimatum, he broke the silence that he has maintained since his conviction late last Saturday night and issued a brief statement.

PLANE HOPS OFF ON CROSS-COUNTRY TRIP

Texas Flier and Companion Leave Los Angeles In Non-Stop Record Attempt.

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.) METROPOLITAN AIRPORT, LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—Capt. Frank M. Hawks, Houston, Texas, aviator, hopped off in his Lockheed monoplane at 5:37:30 o'clock this evening on an attempt to break the present West-East non-stop flight record of 18 hours, 58 minutes, set by Col. Arthur Gosbel.

The plane, loaded with 475 gallons of gasoline and with Oscar E. Grubb, mechanic, as Captain Hawk's companion, made an easy take off in a run of about 2,500 feet. The plane was headed East immediately.

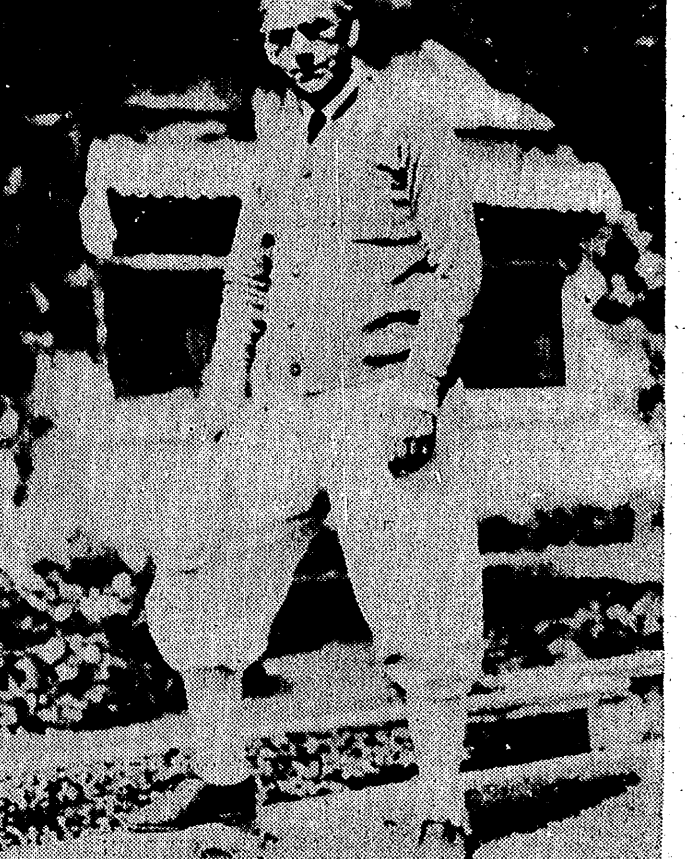
BOMB FAILS DESTINATION

HOOVER PLANS 2-DAY VISIT TO OKEECHOBEE

President-Elect Also Will Attend Birthday Dinner of Edison.

SKIPPER TELLS FLORIDA'S NEEDS

General Upward Revision of Tariffs Forecast By Smoot.

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.)

President-elect Hoover yesterday decided to spend two days late next week inspecting the flood-swept Okeechobee district of southern Florida and to attend the birthday dinner in honor of his friend, Thomas A. Edison, at the inventor's winter estate at Fort Myers Monday.

The announcement of his visit to the Okeechobee region was made yesterday after Mr. Hoover had discussed with Glenn B. Skipper, Republican national chairman from Florida, the recent floods, farm tariffs and other Florida problems.

At the same time Mr. Hoover began a series of conversations with Senator Smoot of Utah, chairman of the senate finance committee, who is his house guest for this week and who predicted a general upward revision of the tariff at the extra session of the new congress in the spring and no more tax reduction for some years to come.

The next president declined to either confirm or deny widely published reports that Henry L. Stimson, governor general of the Philippines, who is sailing for the United States, had been tendered and had accepted appointment as secretary of the state in the Hoover administration.

The position of Mr. Hoover was stated to be that if he began talking about the scores of published suggestions as to who is to form his official family he would be busy doing so during his Florida vacation. He is content to let the suggestions go and to announce his cabinet to the senate on March 4.

Renewed reports that Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford University, would be secretary of the interior were heard from visitors to Hoover headquarters. Dr. Wilbur, it was stated, had obtained a two years' leave of absence from the university of which Mr. Hoover is a trustee.

Another rumor was that it was not at all certain that William M. Jardine would be renamed as secretary of agriculture, although a number of farm organization leaders favor his retention on the ground that he knows the problem of the farmer and has been a capable administrator.

Beside Senator Smoot, who arrived early in the day from Washington, the president-elect received several callers and conferred at length with Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican national committee, who is his guest for the week.

FARMER HANGS SELF AND BABE

Bodies Found Suspended From Same Rope In Granary.

OSBORNE, Kans., Feb. 4. (AP)—The bodies of Albert Langley, 38, a farmer, and his 9-month-old child were found suspended from the same rope at a granary at Langley's home here today.

Coroner J. W. S. Cross said Langley had apparently taken the child in his arms, fastened nooses on the rope about each of their necks and swung the child and himself from a rafter at the same time.

COUNTESS GROSVENOR DIES

CHESTER England, Feb. 4. (AP)—Countess Grosvenor, 73, mother of the Duke of Westminster, and one of the most distinguished women in Britain, died today at her home, Salughton Grange, Chester.
