Names Found On Alleged Run Runner Killed In Indianapolis. INDIANAPOLIS, August 9. (AP)—Toreador King, 77, who police say has been engaged in rum running, was shot and killed early today at the Green Mill dance gardens northeast of this city.

Two girls, entertainers at the gardens, are held under bond of \$10,000 each in rum running, and police are searching for T. H. Smith, who the officers say was with the girls and King shortly before the shooting.

In King's pocket, police said, they found a notebook with names, addresses and telephone numbers of more than 100 bootleggers and rum runners operating in Indianapolis and vicinity.

The book also contained lists of bootleggers and numbers of federal prohibition agents.

Direct circuits to Atlanta were opened up yesterday by the Southern Bell Telephone Company, which is taking business to most points in Florida, except Orlando and Fort Pierce, which are cut off from communication.

The company had two 400-ton power plants at Fort Pierce and Stuart, although no reports have been heard from other cities served by the company which were in the path of the storm.

At Fort Pierce and Vero Beach offices of the Western Union are cut off, although the company has through wire service to Jacksonville and Atlanta via the East Coast.

FORCE OF HURRICANE IS FELT NEAR OCALA

OCALA, Fla., August 9. (AP)—The force of the Florida hurricane, apparently passed to the south of this city, wreaking considerable havoc in the lake region.

Trees were blown down and some places roads were damaged but there was only slight damage to buildings here.

Much fruit was blown from the trees and it is feared that growing crops were damaged.

Deny Storm Damage at Lake Okechobee. TAMPA, Fla., August 9. (AP)—Early reports of heavy damage at the southern end of Lake Okechobee were denied in telephone advice from Clewiston, on the southwest shore of the lake.

Lack of communication made it impossible to confirm reports that Okechobee City was being hit by the hurricane.

At Clewiston was confined to trees, signs and wind.

Continued Delay in Rail Service Is Seen. WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., August 9. (AP)—Service between West Palm Beach and Tampa over the Seaboard Air Line Railway, which was cancelled last night because of washouts, probably will not be resumed for several days, the local offices announced tonight.

In the 15-mile stretch between Indian town and Sebring, there are 55 washouts, varying from 10 to 100 feet in length, Seaboard officials said.

Cuban Fishing Boat Crew Rescued in Gulf. ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., August 9. (AP)—The crew of the Cuban fishing smack was rescued by members of the coast guard cutter Woodbury of the local base, according to reports received here.

The rescue was effected at the mouth of Charlotte harbor, 100 miles south of here, and the crew will be taken to Tampa, where the Cuban fishing smack was rescued.

Storm Moves at Rate of 18 Miles an Hour. WASHINGTON, August 9. (AP)—The weather bureau tonight issued the following advisory storm warning: Tropical disturbance of considerable intensity attended by gales centering tonight probably about latitude 20° north, longitude 100° west, moving west at rate of about 18 miles per hour.

Special observations of unusual character are being made for the benefit of shipping and inhabitants of the islands.

New Tropical Storm Is Watched in Miami. While the new tropical disturbance in the West Indies was being watched by the Miami weather bureau yesterday, the hurricane which swept across Florida from Fort Pierce Tuesday night and Wednesday was dispersing over the gulf coast, information received by Richard W. Gray, meteorologist, indicated.

Mr. Gray received an advisory from Washington late in the afternoon that the new disturbance was south of Santo Domingo at latitude 15° 30' and longitude 75°, caution being advised that the storm might strike the West Indies.

The position given in the advisory tends to throw the probable route of the disturbance to the west, Washington weather bureau officials said.

Miami's weather bureau returned almost to normal with the barometer slightly down, but not unusually so.

Mr. Gray said a south wind, which prevailed Tuesday afternoon, continued yesterday during the entire day at velocities of from 12 to 20 miles an hour.

Linemen of the Southern Bell Telephone Company, Postal Telegraph Company and the Florida East Coast railway, working in the sector from West Palm Beach to Melbourne late yesterday, succeeded in joining up communication facilities were working by 3 p. m. yesterday.

P. L. Gaddis, superintendent here, said: "A special work train carrying 15 linemen of the Western Union was run down the F. E. C. yesterday, the men setting fall poles in the section from Vero Beach to Jupiter where most of the damage was done."

Mr. Gaddis said no damage was done to the company's station at Fort Pierce, which it was reported had been unroofed. He was in Fort Pierce during the height of the blow.

DEMOCRAT GIVES SURVEY OF SOUTH

Alabama and Tennessee Listed Among Doubtful States.

CHICAGO, August 9. (AP)—Returning from a survey through the South, Michael C. Walsh, Democratic candidate for congress from the second Illinois district, today said Gov. Alfred B. Smith would carry Kentucky, Georgia, Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana, but listed Tennessee and Alabama as "doubtful."

Mr. Walsh said George E. Brennan sent him on a survey to ferret out the strength of the Democratic position in the South, which he attended several meetings finding the sentiment to be "more anti-Smith rather than pro-Hoover," they are not so much for Hoover as they are against Smith.
