## Renewed Interest in Development of Groves Observed in Redland Section of Dade County; Havoc Wrought By 1926 Storm and Speculative Real Estate Activities Being Rehabilitated.

Even a casual drive through the Redland section of Dade county indicates a renewed and increasing interest in grove culture. The disastrous results of both the hurricane of 1926 and the preceding subdivision boom, are gradually but unmistakably giving way to an era of new citrus and avocado planting and the rehabilitation of older groves which survived the shock of windstorm and hectic speculation. It is now a most gratifying sight to see the most beautiful results on the grove industry. The land boom of the hurricane.

It is pathetic to note that during the land boom many groves were not only carried up into subdivisions and most of the trees thus destroyed, but still other groves not subdivided were neglected for the reason that the subdividers would seldom pay any more for a tract improved with a fine citrus grove than they would for raw land.
