

MEDICAL AID OFFERED

Daytona Beach Red Cross Unit Assumes Charge of Haleyton Hotel; Upstate Doctors and Nurses Arrive For Work In Caring For Storm Victims.

ARRIVING in Miami yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, the Daytona Beach Red Cross unit immediately took charge of the temporary hospital located in the Haleyton Hotel. C. A. 90 PER CENT DAMAGE TO HOMESTEAD CITRUS HOMESTEAD, Fla., Sept. 21.—With only two deaths reported and less than 20 persons injured, all of whom are expected to recover, the Redlands district is ready to offer up prayers of gratitude to God for His mercy and sympathy to the less fortunate neighboring districts rather than because their own losses, notwithstanding the destruction of 90 per cent of the citrus, avocado and other crops, uninsured, which, together with property damage sustained in the commercial district, are estimated to have cost a loss estimated to exceed \$2,000,000.

REOPENING OF CITIZENS BANK IS REQUESTED HOMESTEAD, Fla., Sept. 21.—A committee of food stores, headed by E. C. Gallaher, president of the Redlands District Chamber of Commerce, made a trip to Miami today to confer with E. M. Porter, chief state banking examiner, to ascertain whether aid could be obtained to reopen the Citizens Bank of Homestead and release \$250,000 in some 1,200 deposits held by whom at the time. According to several stockholders and officials, the stability of the bank, which was closed last July, was greatly improved by a recent reorganization and plans for the bank's reopening were almost perfected prior to the storm. Now, however, it is stated, aid is necessary which, if available, would do much toward relieving many distressing conditions.

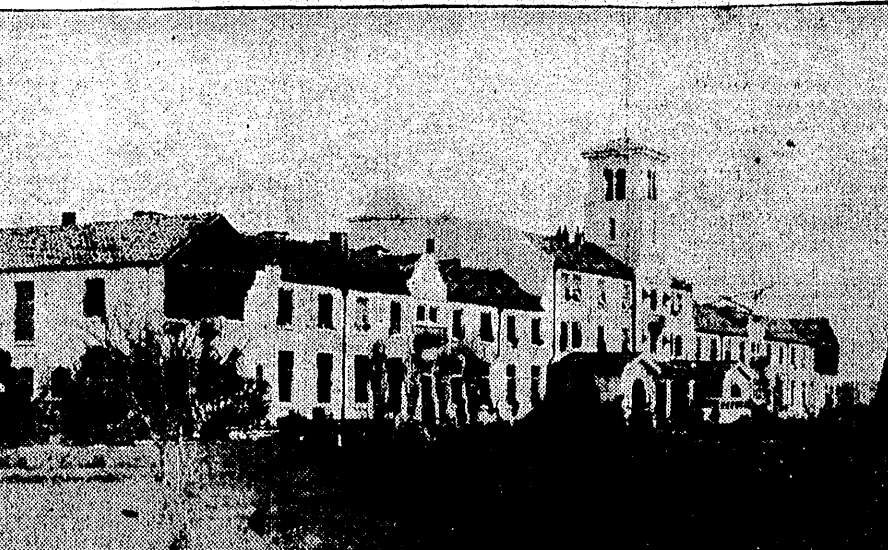

We have sent all of our money but need several trained nurses. Our entire town is at our command."
