

SUSPECT LIVES DAYS WITH NEVERS BODIES

Evidence Tends to Show Murderer Was Deliberate in Making Escape:

Continued From Page 1, Column 5. employed the suspect to make home brew for them and three batches he had made were unfit for a result they had decided to discharge him and expected trouble.

The deputy also discovered that the Nevers about that time had obtained \$100 by pawning jewelry and \$300 more cashing a check.

On March 17, Deputy Cone learned, J. W. Gregg and E. F. Buell, carpenters, of 2315 N. W. Fifty-fifth street, employed by an insurance company, called at the house to repair damages done by a fire about a month ago.

They were met by the suspect who took them to various parts of the house where they made repairs while he watched them. They were not taken at any time to the bedroom in which the body of Mrs. Nevers was found seated in a chair, or to a hall-room closet in which the body of Mr. Nevers was found.

The next day the carpenters completed the repairs and the suspect asked them when the painter would come and how long it would take him to complete his work.

They told him probably a half a day. The painter came that afternoon. Deane said, and did his work under the direction of the suspect who met him. While he was scraping the floor the painter told Deputy Cone he was unable to remove a spot and informed the suspect that it was blood.

The suspected man met the milkman and other delivery men and told them to discharge their goods at the shop of J. Shander, 9201 West Dixie highway, and told him to send workmen to the garage at the home and take the automobile and the automobile and put them on the Nevers' motor car, on which the tires were worn.

After he had remained in the house for several days he was in the normal activities there had been stopped without suspicion he entered the Nevers' automobile and drove away, was Cone's theory.

A blood-stained broom and mop found on the rear porch of the home showed, Deputy Cone said, that the suspect had attempted to wipe the blood marks on the floors where the man and woman were killed. First investigators to reach the scene Friday night said the house was empty but little to indicate there had been a struggle.

A shirt, the sleeves of which were covered with blood, and a pair of socks, also blood-stained, were found in the room which apparently had been occupied by the suspect. The shirt and socks bore the laundry marks of the Nevers. Deputy Cone said he is puzzled by the fact that the suspect's shoes, hat and other articles of clothing were found in the room. A trunk filled with his personal effects was found, he said.

According to friends the Nevers had two motor cars. Both of them are missing. The only automobile found in the yard of the home was that identified as the suspect's, which is believed to be a stolen motor car from Detroit, Mich.

The suspect came to Miami from Detroit November, 1926, according to information gathered by Cone. A coroner's jury which met yesterday in the case of J. E. Tullos, day in the case of the peace in Little River, adjourned until 10 a. m. Thursday to permit police to make a thorough investigation.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Nevers yesterday were placed in sealed vaults and no plans for their disposition had been made as yet. The North Side Funeral Home which has charge is awaiting word from relatives.

Michael Leonard of Tower City, Pa., father of Mrs. Nevers, will arrive in the body of his daughter, he wired the North Side Funeral Home yesterday. Dispatches from Tower City and Mrs. Nevers left Tower City about five years ago and went to New York, where she married Nevers. The Nevers visited Tower City last summer.

Mr. Nevers formerly was a partner in the firm of MacCauley & Nevers, phonograph dealers in Chicago, dispatches from that city said. He left Chicago for Tallahassee, Fla., in 1921 and two years later moved to Miami. Mrs. MacCauley, who is a sister of Mrs. Nevers, had received letters from her sister recently in which she wrote that she was afraid at night in her new home and that on one occasion they had found the lock on Mr. Nevers' automobile broken.

KING ASSERTS HAITIAN ORDER WAS NOT FINAL

Senator Says U. S. Could Have Overruled President Borno's Decision.

NEW YORK, March 26.—Senator William H. King, Democrat, of Utah, declared last night that the refusal of the state department to have the order of President Borno barring him from Haiti withdrawn was "an effort to keep alive the fiction in America about the domination by this government of Haitian affairs."

In an interview at the Hotel Pennsylvania, after he had disembarked from the U. S. transport St. Mihel, on which he came from Santo Domingo, Senator King said that if the state department had so desired it could have compelled the Haitian to withdraw his offer.

Senator King exhibited copies of the order and subsequent correspondence between Brig. Gen. John H. Russell, high commissioner in Haiti, and Gen. J. S. Burdell, American army officer in charge of the Haitian gendarmerie, to prove that the final decision on the order rested with the American high commissioner.

The senator from Utah said that he had refrained from forcing the issue by attempting to enter Haiti in the face of the order barring him because he felt bound to recognize the authority of a de facto government, although he said he believed that government to be illegal and maintained only by the presence of American marines.

He also said he feared that if he had gone to Port Au Prince, a demonstration might have been followed by clash between political opponents of Borno and his supporters. "I intend to continue my efforts to have an independent government established in Haiti and American marines withdrawn," he said. "I will not make an issue of this incident, but will use it, however, in connection with the fight for the withdrawal of American forces from that country."

Senator King said he first was informed of Borno's order barring him while he was in Porto Rico, where the Haitian consul there informed him by letter that he was considered by President Borno as undesirable and would be denied access to Haitian territory.

When he reached Santo Domingo he said his attention was called to the order of the Haitian president barring him.

The senator said he then wrote to the state department protesting the order and intimating strongly that if the state department saw fit it could, through General Russell, have the order rescinded.

The state department's reply, Senator King said, was that he had been advised by President Borno, through the Haitian minister, that refusal to permit the senator to visit Haiti would result in "unpleasant consequences of all concerned."

CESSLER A RECLUSE

OKEECHOBEE SHIPS MUCH MILK TO MIAMI

2,000 Gallons, 500 Dozen Eggs and Other Produce Are Sent To Market.

(HERALD SERVICE.)
OKEECHOBEE, Fla., March 26.—Okeechobee has shipped 2,000 gallons of milk to Miami during the week from new dairies located here in the past year; over 500 dozen eggs were shipped to market besides a considerable quantity of poultry.

Over 1,000 hampers of beans went out from this city by express; over 100 beavers were slaughtered for Palm Beach and Miami markets; lumber shipments were equivalent to 15 car loads; total shipments of vegetables from all communities on shores of Lake Okeechobee were in excess of 200 car loads; over 800 barrels of fish were shipped from this market, valued at \$18 per barrel.

According to Dr. Samuel Shepard, county agent, the number of farmers in Okeechobee county has increased over 300 per cent in 15 months, while acreage under cultivation has increased over 400 per cent in the past six months.

Bank deposits in Okeechobee have increased about 15 per cent in the past 30 days, while bank deposits at Canal Point and Pahokee are said to have doubled since October, 1926.

Moore Haven averaged four car loads of vegetables shipped each day last week.
