



In a specially prepared pamphlet the chamber of commerce sets forth the benefits, to be derived from the deepening of the inlet and draws attention to the following facts regarding Martin county and the district bordering on the many miles of waterway in and near Stuart. According to the pamphlet, Martin

county is rich in natural resources hich could be marketed more eco which could be marketed more eco-nomically through a well developed waterway. In territory tributary to the St. Lucie inlet is standing timber, mostly pine and eypress amounting to over 3,000,000,000 feet, which in addition to its value as lumber, will yield 278,000 barrels of turpentine and 834,000 barrels of resin, There are 10,000,000 pounds of fish shipped an-nually from this territory and with the deepening of the inlet so that larger boats can be used, this amount larger boats can be used, this amount will be doubled. There are over 18,000 tons of citrus fruits, 60,000 tons o fertilizer and 18,000 tons of vegetable

shipped from this territory, the pamphlet states.
According to the chamber, the estimated savings on outbound freight alone would amount to more than \$300,000 each year.
