Potatoes were planted every day from October 15 to April 6, and more will be planted as soon as they find time after the harvest. Some of the land has produced three crops, some two, and more only one.

Mr. Graham, who has a large acreage, says there is no danger of the business being overdone. There were 17,000 bags of potatoes shipped into its idle now, but 200 acres of sugar cane seed will be put out and that is sufficient to plant 2,000 acres, providing the drainage can be controlled.


