

BACK COUNTRY VIEWED

Miami Chamber of Commerce Members See Wonders of Everglades, Inspect Sugar Plantation and Dairy Farm and Make Friends in Hollywood.

YESTERDAY morning at 10 o'clock 50 members of the Miami Chamber of Commerce, with a few friends, assembled on Bay Shore drive near the McAllister Hotel in 12 automobiles, and started on a tour of the Everglades. Each motor car carried a banner and the caravan was piloted by C. E. Riddell, executive secretary of the chamber of commerce.

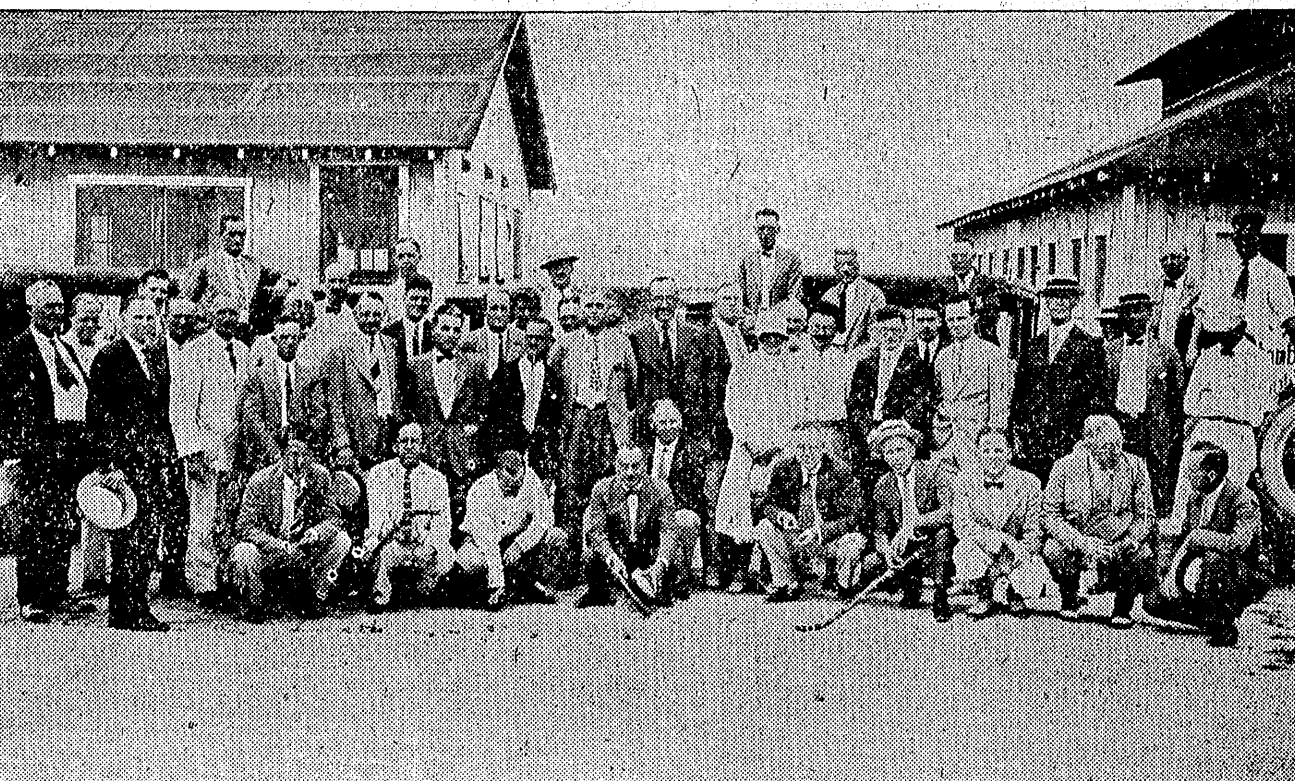
The first stop was made at the Pennsylvania Sugar Plantation, where an inspection of the big plant was made. Here were seen great quantities of new potatoes just out of the ground being run through the graders. These machines are so contrived that the potatoes come out in four different sizes and can be marketed as Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4. The last are so small that they go to the factory and are used in the manufacture of starch and food.

Mr. Graham, who has a large acreage, says there is no danger of the business being overdone. There were 17,000 bags of potatoes shipped in Miami during the last year. The potato is idle now, but 200 acres of sugar cane seed will be put out and it is sufficient to plant 2,000 acres, providing the drainage can be completed.

FROM the plant the party was conducted through the potato fields, a distance of four and a half miles. Mr. Graham explained the things in growing potatoes in Florida: The absence of the Colorado beetle, which is the bane of Northern growers, and the lack of transportation to market. The party inspected the large truck gardens, and Mr. Graham called attention to the healthful conditions of the camp, though the party was conducted through the large dining room in one of the camps and treated liberally to the lunch.

THE visitors next were piloted to the dairy farm owned by Marcus Milton, who welcomed the party and showed his guests through his dairy, where 48 Jersey cows were partaking of their evening meal and being washed down preparatory to milking. Here were seen the half-bred and saw 60 calves. These cattle are all registered, several from the Jersey Isles, and are accorded the best of care here in the dairy through Opa-Locka and North Miami Gardens along the grade of the Seaboard All-Florida Railway to Davie.

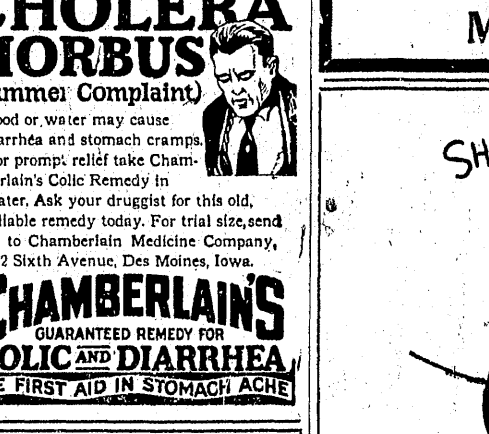
