

Florida Chemical Society Holds

TAMPA. Fla., Feb. 7. (19—Members of the Florida section of the American Chemical Scolety at a meeting here last night went on record favoring the use of poison gas in modern warfare. Resolutions adopted at the moeting set forth that the protocol against poisoning gas drafted at the Glenova conference in May and June. 1995, was drawn with "a tamentable lack of understanding of chemical warfare and the use of hasty and ill-considered action." They pointed out that "the otherical and military experts in the Washington conference of 1921 and 1922, after full discussion, recommended that it was ngainst national safety to try to outlaw chemical warfare, which should be considered and controlled in war expected and controlled in war expected as any other material or method of waging war. 
