OKEECHOBEE W. S. S. COMMITTEES MEET

HAVE INVESTED NEARLY \$1,000 IN STAMPS

Subscriptions Go 50% Above the Quota; Fine Showing in Red Cross and Liberty Bond Sales

OKEECHOBEE, June 17.—(Special)—The war savings committee of Okeechobee county held a meeting at the Red Cross work room Thursday afternoon in response to a call of Chairman R. B. Hamrick. The meeting was called to permit T. W. Lawton, district organizer for the fourth congressional district, to meet the members and discuss plans for the war savings campaign which closes June 23. Mr. Lawton was present at the meeting and made a very earnest and interesting talk on war savings and went something into details in methods and plans worked out by government authorities to successfully disseminate. He explained that the war savings campaign was launched January 1, and that the government expected it to bring in two billion dollars of war funds or just twenty dollars for every man, woman and child in the United States. This estimate is made upon the basis of one hundred million population in this country.

Chairman Hamrick explained that the county war savings campaign was organized in January, and that the work was confined largely to the teachers and parents in the public schools, headed by Mrs. D. B. Austin on the outside. He read a report from the postmaster showing that stamps had been sold in Okeechobee to the amount of \$80; but that the reports have been made through the postoffice at Fort Pierce, hence St. Lucie county had received credit for the stamps in the official bulletins sent out from Washington. He drew attention to the fact that at that rate it would take sixty thousand dollars to reach the quota of six hundred thousand dollars which the government expects to be raised within the next two weeks.

Mr. Lawton stressed the importance of getting the ladies to take a leading part in the movement, and suggested dividing the county into districts with a committee of organizers and workers to canvass each district and see that each person in the district is included. He requested that a committee of men and women of Okeechobee be detailed to go out into the several districts to assist the district committees in organizing for their work.

The estimate of Okeechobee county's population was brought up and discussed, and it was the consensus among those present that the estimate of three thousand people in the county is about 50 per cent. above the actual population, and Mr. Lawton was requested to take this matter up with State Director Griggs of Jacksonville, with a view to having the estimate and quota reduced accordingly. This would bring the county's quota down to one thousand dollars, but would still leave the per capita quota of twenty dollars for every person in the county just as it is for every person in the United States.

Okeechobee county subscribed nearly 50 per cent. over the top in both the third Liberty loan and the Red Cross campaigns, but our people do not like the idea of being assessed on a basis of 50 per cent. over their actual population, because just now the potato market will have a great deal to do with the amount of war savings they are able to take. We hope to see a good market for potatoes before the drive is over, so that our county will have no trouble in going "over the top" as usual.

Mr. Lawton expressed a very sanguine belief that our county would live up to the fine record it has made for itself in both Liberty loans and Red Cross. He mentioned the name of J. Lovvorn as a member of the state speakers' committee, and recommended him to the state director for speaking engagements in this county.

Judge H. H. Hancock was appointed organizer for the east side and Judge J. B. Lovvorn organizer for Okeechobee. The regular organizers in all the districts of the county as soon as these are appointed are requested to assist the regular organizers in all the districts of the county as soon as these are appointed. A publicity committee was also named at this meeting to have general charge of all publicity and advertising in the county. This committee consisted of J. B. Lovvorn, J. E. Lovvorn, J. H. Hancock, T. 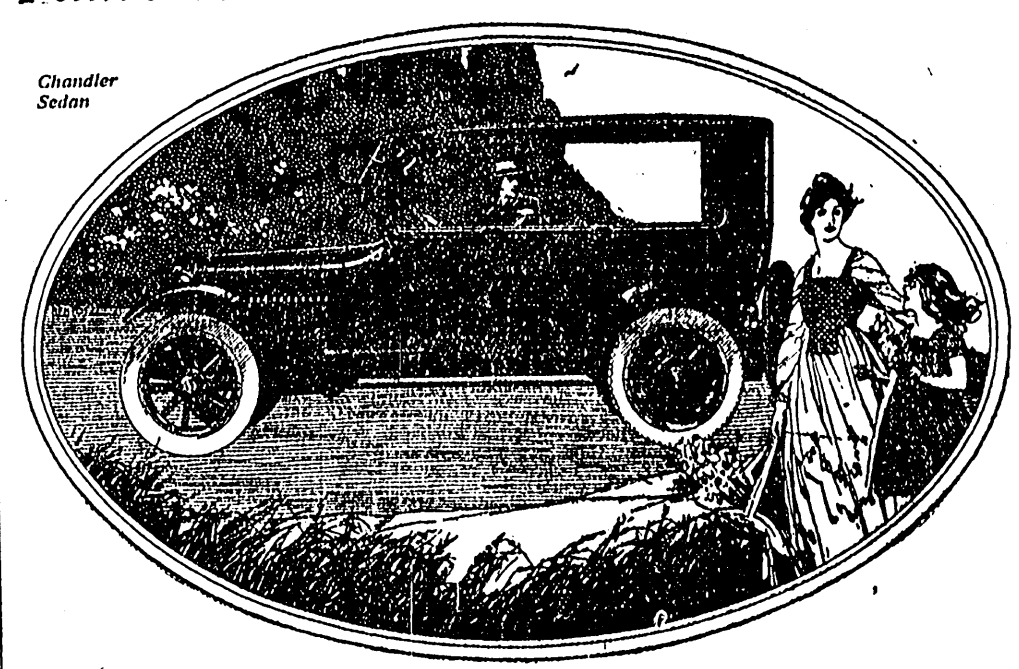
FATHER DROWNS WITH A BABE HE TRIES TO SAVE

GASOLINE EXPLODES AS TEN A. C. L. CARS JUMP TRACK NEAR KATHLEEN

LAKELAND, June 17.—(Special)—Ten cars out of the middle of an A. C. L. freight train jumped the track between Gallop and Kathleen Saturday morning at 9 o'clock, on a car containing gasoline immediately exploding with a force that was felt for several miles. PROBING VENEZUELAN DICTATOR'S SECRETARY FOR HIS PRO-GERMANISM

NEW YORK, June 17.—Dr. Esquillo Vivas, formerly private secretary to Gen. J. V. Gomez, reputed to be the dictator of Venezuela, was removed last night from a South American ship en route to Ellis Island. It was learned today, together with his wife, daughter and two others of their party. They will be held, it was said, pending the finding of a special board of inquiry as to charges of pro-Germanism lodged against Vivas by Carlos J. Bustamanti, newspaper editor of Venezuela, who arrived on the same line. Protests against his detention were made by Vivas, and the Venezuelan consul-general here.

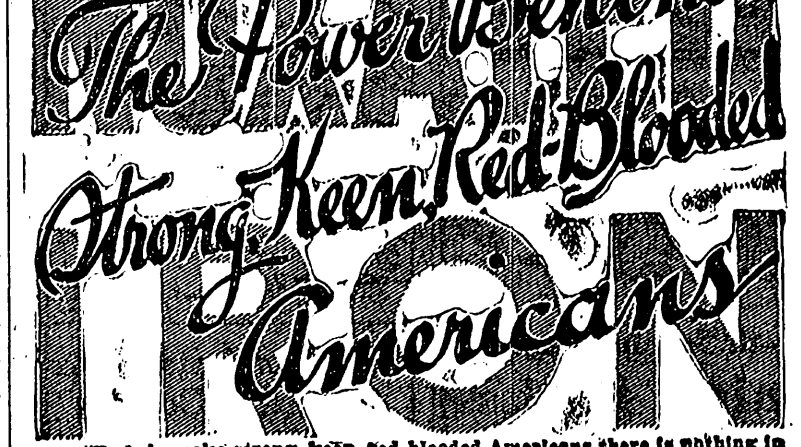
