## Y. M. C. A. MEMBERSHIP DRIVE BEGINS TODAY

PLOT CITY IN DISTRICTS WITH TEAM FOR EACH

Everybody Enthusiastic and Feel Sure of Getting "500 in Four Days"

The team captain and the members of the executive committee of the Y. M. C. A. lined up, who will start the big membership drive today, met last night at the dinner given in the Y. M. C. A. headquarters and the captains received their allotments of territory to be worked.

After all were seated and everything in readiness for the dinner Rev. C. E. Pease, asked that Divine blessing and the dinner provided by Caterer Bostain was thoroughly enjoyed.

At the close of the meal President Frank Bentley addressed the meeting briefly, stating the program for the drive and giving an outline of the plan on which the committee had decided to come.

He said that in the past it had been the custom to appoint a large committee, sometimes as many as 200, who all agreed to work and some of them did, but there were many who did not. So this time it was decided to have a smaller committee and get men all of whom will work.

Mr. Bentley then introduced Dr. McNair of Jacksonville, head of the Y. M. C. A. war work for Florida. Dr. McNair spoke very interestingly, stressing the importance of continual and enthusiastic work here. If "we would win the war over there," he said that his education had not been complete until yesterday although he had lived pretty much all over the country, but now he has spent the day in Tampa and felt that that completed it.

He said that he had many calls to ally himself as pastor of several churches but felt that he could do a greater good and work to better advantage by continuing to work in the Y. M. C. A. which he intended to do.

"Tampa stands unique," said Dr. McNair, "in the fact that when any great movement is to be put through the great business men of the city give their services to its accomplishment." Dr. McNair stated that he is a member of the Rotary Club, the Shriners, Commercial Club of Nashville and in fact a member of every order and society under heaven with the exception of the Bartenders' Association; and he had been sceptical of many accomplishments of the Y. M. C. A. campaigns. He spoke on the necessity of the teams going out with the firm insurance and confidence that they are going to get the members they are after.

At the conclusion of Dr. McNair's remarks Mr. Bentley told Secretary Turner to speak on the team captaining on behalf of the campaign. Mr. Turner said that the teams are to report to him today at 10 o'clock to commence the campaign, and are to appear each day thereafter at 12:15 and have dinner and then start on the afternoon's work, with the exception of the team which is to go to the shipyards and will work the shipyards and will be unable to get around in their dinner at that hour.
