

RED CONCERN REVEALS DERBY VICTORY IN SPECIAL MATCH RACE

RED LINE HOME NEXT

Martlow Punch Barely Misses Second Place; Fat Chance Trails Far Behind.

RED CONCERN, winner of the Miami Derby, removed all doubt as to which was the best dog in that event when he came down the stretch with a furious drive to win the half mile ninth race. It was an added feature, the outcome of a rivalry among the four owners who were not satisfied with the outcome of the Derby and O. H. Smith, president of the Kameon Club had hung up a \$300 purse for the match.

Red Line broke on top and went out to make the pace, with Red Concern following. Martlow Punch in third place and Fat Chance a trailer from the start. Red Line held firmly to his lead for three-eighths of a mile, when at the head of the home stretch Red Concern was allowed to begin to close on him. In the last 25 yards Red Concern went to the front and on to win by two lengths. Martlow Punch failed to get up along side Red Line.

RED CONCERN'S victory appeared to be almost as great a one as in the derby, for the stands were in an uproar as he was led back to the judges stand. Red Concern now stands not only the undisputed champion of the season but also probably the most popular dog of the meeting as a result of his gallantness.

In the sprint feature over the 1/8-mile, Little Lady Splinters covered herself with glory by outrunning the favorite Dark Prince. She proved best of the rest, all fast ones. Bottle, a new Britisher, topped the next feature, a futurity in a blanket race with the Kameon Club members following. Martlow Punch, Miss Callahan and Mr. Hoo Doo, Miss Callahan was winner of the opening dash and Lady Laurel and Fat took down the two quarter miles.

As the dogs went to the post for the eighth race, the steeplechase, Mutchler's hand struck up Auld Lang Syne with the Kameon Club members leading the crowd joined lustily in singing. Ernest Bill II responded by going out and winning the jumps handily from Rolley-Tees and Irish Steeple.

Then came the half mile race and amid a medley of patriotic tunes by the band and the cheering of the multitude from the crowd, the meeting came to a successful close.

All uncashed mutual tickets, it was announced, will be cashed by the presented at the track office before April 23.

AN UNBLED treat, a thirteen-sixteenths of a mile race, the longest ever staged on a dog track, and a half-mile meeting of four Miami Derby contestants sped the fifth season of greyhound racing into history at Hialeah Park last night.

The interest in the event was confined only to that of Derby night, and one of the largest crowds of the season was on hand to bid the dogs to the track, and amongst the thousands present it was particularly noticeable that home folk were in the great majority.

Lady Like, race, originally made up as a nine-sixteenths of a mile event, in itself the longest dog race ever run, turned out to be a quarter of a mile race, and amongst the thousands of the dogs were so eager to continue that they went on around the track for a third time.

ADY LIKE, the game little distance dog owned by Miss Mary Smith, which all season has demonstrated her liking to a route by taking the field on a second lap of the track on three previous occasions, was winner of the nine-sixteenths. Black Gold, always prominent in the running, finished her career as runner-up, and Clever Leaf, last at one stage, came from far back to be third.

Lady Like knowingly retired at the end of the race and Black Gold also pulled up, but the others continued to gallop in as thrilling a race as one might expect to see on a dog track. Clever Leaf, who had been a home cashmerine by a great stretch, drove that noted him absolutely nothing. The time for the nine-sixteenths was 47 seconds and away from the start the ability of a greyhound to traverse a route.

BROWER BOOSTS WILLS

Former Chairman of Boxing Commission Will Vote Against Dempsey-Tunney Bout.

NEW YORK, April 22.—It being generally known that Chairman James A. Farley of the boxing commission is for a Jack Dempsey-Harry Wills heavyweight championship fight and strongly against a Dempsey-Gene Tunney meeting for the same prize in either New York or Jersey, that Commissioner William Muldoon is against the mixed match, and favors a Dempsey-Tunney fight in New York with Tex Rickard promoting, a statement from the third member of the commission, George E. Brower, is in order.

Mr. Brower, who was chairman before Mr. Farley, and was voted out of the honor at a meeting which he did not attend, was interviewed today in his Brooklyn law offices. He has not been attending commission meetings regularly, but knows what is going on, and will be on the job when the issue created by Rickard in going west to sign Dempsey, unquestionably for a Tunney fight, is voted on by the solons. He said:

"I THINK a Dempsey-Wills match is in order if it is possible to put it on. I have not been shown that it is impossible, so will favor it until convinced that the men will never meet, if that happens to be the truth.

"If the mixed match is impossible, then I will be prepared to take a stand on the Dempsey-Tunney idea, but not until the other conclusion is reached. I will be present at any meeting at which this question is brought up, will cast my vote and take an active part in the proceedings.
