"VICTORY" DRIVE FOR WAR STAMPS IS GOING ON IN TAMPA FOR PRESENT

THREE BUYS OPEN THE CAMPAIGN EARLY. COUNCIL PREPARING FOR SPECIAL SESSION.

List of Buyers Will Be Sent to Pershing and Campaign Is for a Thanks Offering to Boys

Close to 20,000 "Victory" cards are being circulated among Tampanians for them to fill out with a contribution to the nation's thank offering to Pershing and the boys over there. Uncle Sam is making it worth while for folks to sign them. He pays well, too, for he's giving \$5 certificates of indebtedness, in the shape of war saving stamps, for \$4.25 the card was started on their rounds yesterday and before midnight three Tampanians had joined for a total of \$75 worth.

Chandler got his card and didn't wait to mail it back with his application, but stepped directly into the cashier's office and bought \$100 worth of stamps for fifty cents. Somewhat of a bargain, O. A. Setzer of the Curry building was the first addition by the mail. His card came back promptly for fifty cents. The name on the list that goes to Pershing from Tampa will be that of Chas. Roehlig, an electrical fixtures merchant at No. 303 West Lafayette street, who bought \$75 worth.

To Show the Boys You are Thankful While an effort is being made to place Victory cards in the hands of every family in the city, City Chairman Leitch realizes that such a task is impossible and has a goodly supply at the post office where they will be furnished upon application.

The card is addressed: "To General Pershing and the Boys Over There." As a thanksgiving offering for what you have done for us and for the honor of Tampa and my home town, I hereby pledge myself to buy war saving stamps (at 40 cents each) before Thanksgiving Day, November 28th.

DOUGHNUTS \$10 EACH AT ST. PETE

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 19.—(Special.)—Hotel and restaurant men of St. Petersburg will have a meeting Thursday evening with Arthur St. Wood, Pinellas county food administrator, to hear from him a statement of the regulations that will be in effect in this city during the war.

The biggest doughnut sale ever held in this state was held last night when the Salvation Army, with the assistance of the county guard and Marine Tobin and Buck Turner, well-known showmen, disposed of hundreds of doughnuts for \$10 each. The sale was started this morning and doughnuts were sold all during the day but the big event was held last night when the army went to work in earnest and with the aid of a piano and the Liberty chorus sold doughnuts as fast as they could be made.

FOOD ADMINISTRATION MAKES DRASTIC RULES

WEEKLY INSPECTION OF ALL GROCERIES

Any Attempt at Profiteering to Be Followed by Immediate Closing

of the men from the front there will almost inevitably be a falling off of wages from the present scale and the government intends to see to it that there will be no increase in prices.

The new regulations which are to be put into effect at once include the inspection once a week of every grocer and jobber in every county in the United States and it is distinctly stated, said Mr. Jones, that any infraction of the rules as to prices will be followed by immediate closing of the offending establishment.

The people will be asked to continue to conserve on many things, and especially on fats and sugar, as we shall have to feed, according to Hoover, not less than 400,000,000 people, and it is "a crime against humanity to get up from the dinner table with a tight belt."
