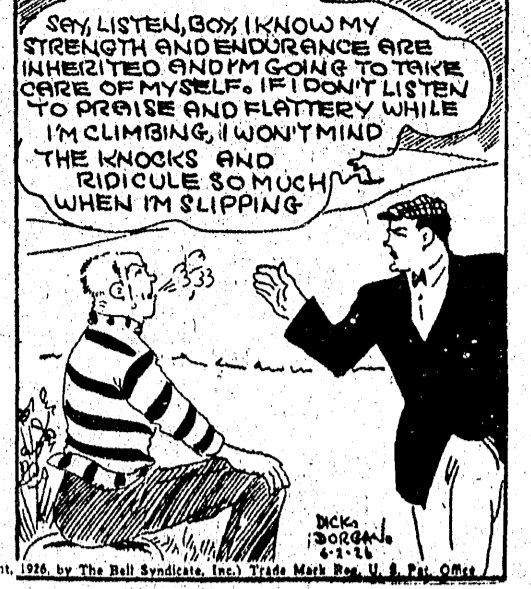

NORTH DAKOTA.

SCHAFFER—The McKenzie county commission will have an audit of the county's treasurer's books for six years back to determine whether there is an alleged shortage.

BEATRICE—Samuel Davis, 85, Civil War veteran and one of the first employees of the Dempster Mill Manufacturing Company here, is dead.
WILBER—Frank Sasek of Creston, Iowa, died here.

TEXAS.

THORNTON—After getting less than \$1,000 from the bank and failing to blast open the safe, crackmen set fire to the Farmers National Bank here.
PORT NECHES—An airplane pilot spent a fruitless three hours flying over swamps in search of G. W. Buford, 60, missing several days.
EL CAMPO—A graduating class of 15 girls and 11 boys received diplomas in commencement exercises at the high school.
BEAUMONT—E. I. Watson was elected president of the Beaumont Typographical Union and Percy Marchbanks delegate to the International convention at Colorado Springs.
CORPUS CHRISTI—At a conference of fishermen held here it was agreed that opening new passes and deepening old ones of Padre Island will best protect the diminishing supply.
GAINESVILLE—Nathan A. Story was sentenced to 90 years for the murder of Fred Crain at Krum last January 20.
SAN ANTONIO—More than 800 delegates attended the convention here for three days of the Ladies' Society of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

MINNESOTA.
PIPESTONE—Homer Collins pleaded guilty to having received stolen property and was sentenced to two and a half years in prison at Stillwater.

INTERNATIONAL FALLS—Memorial day ceremonies were held here under auspices of the American Legion post.

ST. PAUL—The state highway department has requested motorists to be more careful in driving past road patrolers, as several employees have been injured.

WAUKESHA—A jury which deliberated nearly a whole night acquitted William Van Dusen, 71, farmer, of the murder of Daniel Davis.
ASHLAND—Preparations are being made for beginning the trial of John Crowley of Odanah on June 20 for wife murder.
MINOCQUA—Four hundred cans of wall-eyed pike fry from the state hatchery were planted in lakes in Oneida and Vilas counties.
LADYSMITH—Beekeepers of Wisconsin at the annual convention here consented to the looking to future shipment of honey by the carload from northern Wisconsin.
IRON RIVER—John Patry, Orienta farmer, was seriously injured by an explosion while blasting stumps with dynamite.

PENNSYLVANIA.
PITTSBURGH—The army engineer has approved plans for spending \$1,540,000 for improvements on the Allegheny river here.
NAZARETH—The "grand old man" of this cement region, Edmund J. Reinhard, who taught school 60 years, has reached 92 years, and is hale and hearty.
EASTON—The ninety-first commencement at Lafayette College was started yesterday, with a program that will end in graduation exercises June 10.
NORRISTOWN—Joseph A. Ranok was re-elected president of the Montgomery County Manufacturers' Association at the eighteenth annual meeting.
LEHIGHTON—Paul Stout, 22, committed suicide when told he must undergo an operation for appendicitis.
HAZELTON—Work on the new aviation field on top of Broad Mountain, between this place and Mauch Chunk, has been started.
ABINGTON—An attempt to hurry a wood fire with kerosene caused the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Wesser of Nesheiming. Her clothing caught fire.
