Ragan said the motion was out of order, and suggested that the board should not "take sides."

The mayor was out for more power, and there was nothing for Mr. Griffin to do but to get out, said Rosenthal. The vote was then taken without roll call.

The vote was followed immediately by consideration of the advisory committee's report in which many recommendations were approved on the spot.

Rosenthal opened discussion on the report, saying the city is now unable to borrow money because financial interests have lost faith in its government.

With little discussion a recommendation covering a vigorous policy tax collection was approved. So was a recommendation that a reassessment be made by a board of appraisers.

LEGISLATURE MOVES AHEAD IN ITS WORK

Tomasello Announces Standing Committees

TALLAHASSEE, April 4.—(Associated Press.)—Both the senate and the house gave promise today of answering the governor's call for full speed ahead and completion of legislative work as soon as possible.

All nominees of last night's caucus met in joint session to hear the governor's message and then drew up plans for active business tomorrow.

Leaders Take Seats T. G. Fitch, Leesburg, took the presidency of the senate and Peter Tomassello of Ocochee was elected speaker of the house shortly after the session was opened formally.

Tomassello announced his standing committee appointments at a brief session and Fitch said he would have senate committees ready tomorrow.

Representative Lewis, Palm Beach county, sought unanimous permission to introduce a bill in the house today.

Sholtz Calls for Lower Tag Prices, Beer and Economy

legalizing beer, such legislation being in keeping with the state and national democratic platforms and our national administration. Such legislation must provide for strict regulation of the traffic and the maximum revenue to be derived therefrom.

Comment On Repeal That ended the beer lesson. On the question of repealing the 18th amendment the governor said:

"The national congress has passed an act submitting to the states the question of the repeal of the 18th amendment and has requested that the state of Florida cause the amendment to be submitted to a convention for such action as may be had. It therefore becomes your duty to pass such legislation as is necessary to submit the question."

Governor Sholtz reached out to deal with another angle of the beer, or liquor problem, as set forth by the constitution of the state:

"Likewise it is proper for this legislature to submit an amendment to our own constitution to the people at the general election in November of next year, allowing the voters to determine whether they want state prohibition repealed."

Six Relief Bills Ready To carry out the speed-up program, the governor announced that he had six bills ready for immediate introduction, all self-reliant, so that the legislature might have a program. These were:

Appropriations, schools, motor vehicle license tags, county officers' salary fees and debt funding commission. There was an earnest appeal for harmony, for cooperation, for pulling together and plugging to get the job over with at once, however big that job might prove to be, when tackled.

"This is no time for political bickering," he said. "Politics should be banished from our consideration of the grave problems which we have to meet. We are in the midst of a national crisis."

Date for Sentencing of Boxer Still Unsettled

There was no intimation yesterday as to when Judge Petteway of criminal court would sentence Pete McGregor, amateur boxer, convicted by a jury Feb. 16 of causing the death of Herman Robinson. McGregor was in court, awaiting sentence Monday. He was sent back to jail, the judge saying he wanted more time to talk with relatives of Robinson.

Members of Robinson's family said yesterday that published reports that Robinson also was a boxer were incorrect. They explained that he went to a Tampa street beer place for the first time in January and that while there was hit by McGregor, a man he did not know and had never seen until that night. He died from the effects of the blow.

No Action on Airport No action was taken on a recommendation that the airport be leased. No action was taken concerning salary department suggestions. The pensions clause was passed over.

Aldermen Adopt Proposals of Tax Reduction League

Merger of city and county governments, creation of a city budget board, repeal of the election board law and a proposal to budget only half of the current interest requirements on the city's bonded indebtedness for the coming year were approved by the board of aldermen last night.

Action on pensions for city employees and delinquent taxes was deferred.

The board was acting on the report of a committee which had been considering recommendations of the Hillsborough County Tax Reduction association.

Opposition to a merger plan for city and county governments was voiced by Alderman Pacheco who said he wanted to know more about the details. Alderman Prazier said the plan has worked elsewhere and would undoubtedly save money here.

The board referred to the hospital committee a recommendation from the Hillsborough County Medical society that the city hospital be placed in charge of a self-perpetuating board of trustees.

Action on the municipal legislative program was deferred until a special session tonight at 8 o'clock.
