# MOTHER SENT TO PRISON FOR

Mrs. Stone of Maryland Faints When 18-Year Term Is Given.

SON'S MURDER

**NEW TRIAL PLEA** DENIED BY COURT

Convicted Recently of Giving Poison To 15. Year Old Boy.

BELAIR, Md., Oct. 5 .- Mrs. Hattle stone was sentenced today to serve 18 years in the penitentiary for the murder of her 15-year-old son by poison.

Judge W. W. Preston denied he petition for a new trial and pronounced the sentence, given under the jury's verdict convicting her of second de

Mrs. Stone fainted in the prisoner's dock after hearing the sentence pro nounced, but was soon revived.

Mrs. Stone's son, George, died June , and examination by a chemist revealed a quantity of poison. In her trial the state argued that the poison of which he died was fatal within two nours after being administered and declared nobody but the mother had given the boy any food, drink or medicine in a much longer time be fore his death.

### A Caravan of Prophets

SOME very fine, loyal and patriotic Miamians have been campaigning for passage by the people of the Miami Airport and Harbor District bill at the election October 15.

They feel it is necessary that a board separate from the Miami City Commission be given control of Miami's airport and harbor facilities. It is to be feared that, in their anxiety to have an airport finer than is possessed by any city anywhere, they have deluded themselves into believing that they can get this airport more quickly through a port authority than they could by working through the Miami City Commission.

These sincere gentlemen have permitted themselves to fall into the caravanseral of prophets who are come out of the wilderness, pushing ahead of them a golden calf of Baal, strumming a symphony of false prosperity upon their silvery lutes.

Not for them the cold, hard facts of taxation. Nor would they discuss the needs of the moment. They have fixed their eyes upon a mirage of iridescent splendor, which appears to be at the edge of the eastern sky. Huge transport planes from Europe and the world at large

are landing on this vast field of imagery, and the time is just around the corner when fliers will be coming here from Mars, Jupiter and Venus, bringing to earth the commerce and tourists of interplanetary space.

The only trouble with the picture is that it is just a mirage. Miami is rapidly coming into her own as a center of air transportation. Rightly so. But the city commission of Miami has full and complete authority to provide facilities to handle air traffic as rapidly as needs arise. It is not necessary to create a new board with new expenses and new powers to handle the airport necessities of the community. Nor is it necessary to give to a new board power of control over airports which may be created by any other municipality in Dade county.

When a new board is created it inevitably follows that new expense is added to the people. Taxes are as inescapable as death. Death of the proposed Miami Airport and Harbor District measure will at least save the people some tax money.
