W. Y. C. Hume Said To Have Only Slight Chance For Recovery.

ONCE ACQUITTED OF KILLING

Unwritten Law Successfully Pleaded As Defense In Cabaret Tragedy.

FORMER WIFE BACK

Woman Who Divorced Him Returns To Act As His Nurse During Illness.

Y. C. HUME, widely known Miamian, president of the Tropical Realty Company, attempted to end his life yesterday afternoon in his apartment at 928 N. W. Eighth street road. He fired a bullet into his head, fracturing his skull.

"I hardly had enough strength to pull the trigger," he told attendants at Jackson Memorial hospital, where little hope last night was held for his recovery. Hume remained conscious He has been ill for some time relatives reported and has made several

previous attempts to end his life. RELATIVES said Hume has acted strangely and has been melan choly since he shot and killed Recio Celona, cabaret owner, in the latter's place at S. Miami avenue and Sev

enth street, on September 29, 1924. Huma was acquitted in a second trial after he had pleaded the unwrit ten law and self defense. The jury disagreed in his first trial.

\$50,000 Damages For Alleged Breach of Promise.



4 Explosions In Oil Plant Shake District and Scatter Flames.

600.000 GALLONS BURNING

Blaze Endangers 6 Tank Cars and Building Stored With Gasoline.

HOMES ARE IGNITED

Firemen Devote Efforts To Pre-Vent Spread; Five Are Injured In Blast.

[BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.] BALTIMORE, August 10.—Residents were ordered to leave their homes in the Hanover street section of South Baltimore late today when fire, sweeping the huge storage plant of the American Oil Company, got beond control. Four explosions shook the section and scattered flames to nearby buildings. Five firemen, injured in one of the blasts, were

Fifteen tanks, each holding 40,000 gallons of gasoline, were buring, Six tank cars, each of 20,000-galion capacity, were within the burning region, which is but 200 feet from the plant of the Consolidated Gas Company where a large quantity of oil and gasoline is stored.

Although several homes are burnng in the Wells and Winder street section, firemen believe there was no loss of life due to the bursting of the oil tanks shortly after the fire started. This permitted the oil to run down the streets. Firemen devoted their efforts to preventing spread of the flames.

One hundred thousand persons were drawn to the acene by the pall of black smoke.
