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T. W. HIGGENBOTHAM GRANTED NEW TRIAL

Supreme Court Reverses Circuit Court on Change of Venue.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—Thomas W. Higgenbotham, convicted in Columbia county Circuit Court last July of second degree murder and sentenced to 20 years as an outgrowth of the death of Martin Tabert, North Dakota youth, was granted a new trial by an opinion handed down late today by the Florida Supreme Court, reversing the lower court.

The lower court was reversed on the change of venue, one of the grounds, raised by Higgenbotham. The Supreme Court, in its opinion, written by Judge Browne, held that the Circuit Court judge erred in granting the change of venue from Dixie county to Columbia county on motion by the state and over the defendant's objection without first having made an actual test as to whether it was practically impossible to procure an impartial jury in Dixie county.

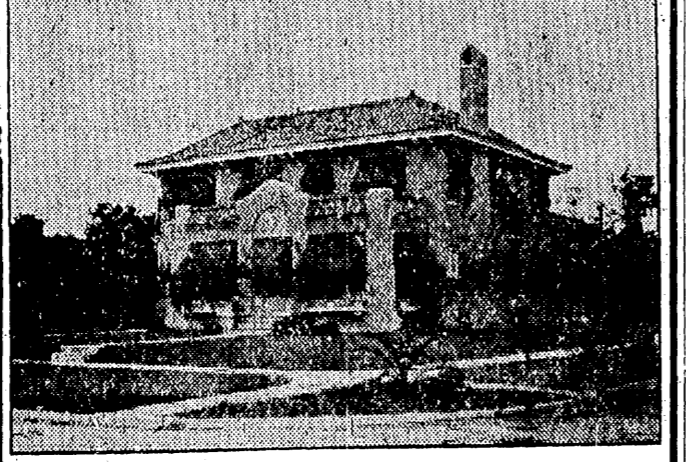
STAGE PICNIC SUPPER
