PRYOR RETIRED AS REPUBLICAN STATE LEADER

Wentworth of Pensacola Named Chairman

JACKSONVILLE, June 20.—(Associated Press.)—With jubilant shouts of "Hoover and Howey" the republican high command in Florida today marshalled its forces for the drive to the November general election.

President Hoover and Vice President Curtis, renominated by the republican national convention, were endorsed by the Florida executive committee in session here while W. J. Howey, the party's nominee for governor, and candidates for other state offices, also were pledged undivided support.

George F. Wentworth of Pensacola, long a power in the party, was returned to state control when he defeated the incumbent, R. E. L. Pryor of Tampa, for chairman of the state committee. The vote was Wentworth, 30; Pryor, 26, on a secret ballot. It was Wentworth who, two years ago, put up and supported Pryor for the chairmanship.

"Lily White" Move Tabléd

An effort to sever the party from negroes was made by Fred Butler of Melbourne, but his motion to have the state committee limit participation in its primaries to white persons was tabled without a record vote.

Judge Dwight Ford, of Bradenton, was elected vice chairman, Mrs. Clara Hawkins of Brooksville, and Mrs. H. B. York of Oxford, vice chairwomen, and W. R. O'Neal of Orlando, state treasurer. These elections were without opposition, as was that of Alan Walker of Winter Haven, to be state secretary.

A campaign manager for Howey and other republicans on the state-wide ticket in November will be named later by the campaign committee appointed at a recent state convention in Orlando. Members of this committee are George Livingston of Tampa; Walter D. Shelley, Jacksonville; Mrs. Klara Monroe and Charles R. Pierce, Miami; N. Dwight Ford, Bradenton, and one to be named by A. F. Knotts of Yanketown, candidate for state comptroller.

Mrs. Sidney C. Brown of Tampa, was named state woman's organizer for the general election. She is the national committee woman.

Negro Pleads Self-Defense In Slaying of Veterinary

ALBANY, Ga., June 20.—(A.P.)—Sam Hall, negro, claimed self-defense today as he was held in Dougherty county jail for safe keeping after threats against him in Bainbridge where he was arrested for the fatal shooting of Dr. R. H. Herron, veterinary surgeon and civic leader.

Dr. Herron, 37, was shot Saturday night. Officers said they found the negro standing over the body with two pistols in his hands, one of them belonging to the veterinary surgeon. Feeling in the community rose and Hall was hurried out of town to an unannounced destination.

Sheriff O. F. Tarver and his deputies brought Hall here last night from Cairo where he was first held.

Bainbridge officers said they were told the negro shot Dr. Herron after cursing him when the veterinarian's automobile came near striking Hall's wagon.

Star To Wed



LOS ANGELES, June 20.—(A.P.)—Surprising friends and film fans, Jean Harlow and Paul Bern, motion picture celebrities, disclosed an unannounced romance today by filing notice of intention to wed.

The platinum blonde film star and Bern, an executive of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios, said plans for a wedding had not been completed and they had not decided when the marriage would take place.

Former Service Men Rap Slander Against Sholtz

JACKSONVILLE, June 20.—(Special.)—Resolutions denouncing and condemning "slandering and insidious propaganda" against Dave Sholtz, candidate for governor, were adopted unanimously here tonight by the Ex-Servicemen's Sholtz-Rocco Governor club, headed by A. Rocco King, former state commander of the American Legion.

The club is composed of 200 war veterans and was organized to assist the Sholtz campaign in Duval county, endorsing Sholtz because of his service in the navy during the World War, as well as because of his platform on economy, tax relief and other issues. Sholtz' campaign, the veterans declared in their resolutions, is being conducted on a high plane and their candidate is valiantly waging a fight for the same ideals and principles for which we fought during the great conflict.

Work on Stone Mountain Memorial To Be Resumed

ATLANTA, Ga., June 20.—(A.P.)—Gutzon Borglum, sculptor, today said work would be resumed on Stone Mountain memorial.

Borglum spent part of the day in conference with Mayor James L. Key and has an appointment to see Governor Russell tomorrow. He did not say when work would be started.

STEAL 4000 CIGARS

More than 4000 cigars, made exclusively for a San Francisco dealer, were stolen during the week-end by thieves, who broke a rear window to gain entrance to the Bustillo Brothers-Diaz factory at Pine street and Albany avenue, West Tampa. Because the cigars bear the California film's label, detectives believe the thieves will be captured easily. Three sets of fingerprints were taken from the broken window pane.

CURTAIN WORK ON OKEECHOBEE FLOOD CONTROL

Caused by Inability To Collect Taxes

WEST PALM BEACH, June 20.—(Associated Press.)—Deficient tax collections will seriously curtail the coming year's work on the federal government's \$9,000,000 Lake Okeechobee flood control plan, it was said at the flood control district's offices here today.

Officials of the district said that, although the federal government will make available \$2,450,000 on June 30 for carrying on the work, the district will be able to contribute only about \$100,000 over its normal share of the cost is \$700,000.

Under an act of congress in 1930, taken to prevent any such disasters as that of 1928 when floods took a heavy toll of lives and property, financing of the work of erecting dikes and other flood control works was to be done on a 7 to 2 basis, the flood control district furnishing \$2 to every \$7 furnished by the federal government.

Low tax collections indicate the district will be unable to match the June 30 appropriation in that way, officials said, although they expect the work to go forward in greatly curtailed form.

To date \$1,210,882 has been spent on the project, the district furnishing \$210,027.

Work which had been planned for the coming year included building of 24 miles of levee at a cost of \$1,525,000 around the south shore of Lake Okeechobee, construction of flood gate structures costing \$350,000 and dredging of the Caloosahatchee canal between Moore Haven and Fort Thompson, \$900,000.

Capital Police Urge Congress Help For Vets

Bonus Leader Frowns on Third Party Talk

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(Associated Press.)—Congressional aid for the capital's army of bonus-seeking veterans was urged by police tonight as the former service men's commander strove to steer his charges away from thought of a third party.

Convinced that the veterans' leaders are prepared to keep between 8000 and 9000 men in the city until they receive aid, Pelham D. Glassford, police superintendent, told newspapermen that congress should "do something for the bonus marchers."

Meanwhile, to strengthen the case of the 20,000 veterans now here demanding the bonus payment, their commander-in-chief, Walter W. Waters of Portland, Ore., repudiated all talk of a third party.

Center on Elections

He urged that all efforts be concentrated on the November elections, with the thought of a third party only as an alternative to defeat of candidates opposing bonus payment.

He repeated, however, a previous attack on President Hoover for his attitude toward the bonus.

"Hoover is out, so far as we are concerned," Waters said. He laid before his committee a plan for a national organization throughout the country to be known by the letters "B. E. P." standing for the marchers' coined name, the "bonus expeditionary force."

He decried charges that he was affiliated with a fascist group, and threatened legal action against anyone who claimed he was connected with "any other group than the bonus expeditionary force."

Murder Charged to Menjou's Adopted Son in Auto Death

LOS ANGELES, June 20.—(A.P.)—Formal charges of murder and driving while intoxicated were filed today against Harold L. Menjou, 20-year-old adopted son of Adolphe Menjou, screen star, as an outcome of an automobile accident yesterday in which young Menjou's girl companion was killed. Bond was set at \$10,000.

The complaint was attested by Motorcycle Patrolman Perry Jones, who said he was pursuing the youth's speeding car when it overturned, killing Marjorie Gauthier, 16, Beverly Hills high school pupil.

Adolph Menjou said today he had not seen the youth in more than eight years and had nothing to do with his upbringing.

The actor adopted the boy in 1923, but was divorced from his mother eight years ago. She is now the wife of A. L. Abraham, Los Angeles attorney.

Fox Leaves Capital After Being Denied Release From Quiz

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(A.P.)—William Fox, who made millions in the movie and theater business, quietly checked out at his hotel today and was believed to have returned to New York, although still under subpoena to testify in the senate stock market investigation concerning his financial operations.

The former head of the Fox Film and Fox Theater Corporation spent virtually all his five days in Washington in a hotel room, sending word each morning to the senate banking committee that he was too ill to testify. Doctors told the committee any severe nervous strain might endanger his health or life.

During Fox's absence, the committee's counsel charged the theatrical man with participating in a short selling pool in stock of one of his own corporations in 1929 and accepting payment in a check made out to another to keep the transaction secret.

Fox sent a representative today to Chairman Norbeck, asking that he be released from the subpoena. The committee refused to do so but took no action on a request that Fox be permitted to return to New York to recuperate.

Florida Delegation Will Demand Repeal Plank in Platform

JACKSONVILLE, June 20.—(A.P.)—Inclusion of an "out and out" prohibition repeal plank in the party's platform will be insisted upon by Florida's delegation to the democratic national convention.

Robert H. Anderson of Jacksonville, delegation member who has been named on the convention's platform and resolutions committee, made the announcement today as the state's aggregation of four women and 14 men made preparations for leaving for the Chicago meetings.

The Florida delegation will establish its Chicago headquarters in the Palmer house. In casting its vote, it will not be bound by the unit rule and in all probability the members will cast their ballots individually. They all have resolved, however, to support Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York for president.

Would Trade for Statesman

In an address full of statistics and pungent phrases he told of the nations' economic interdependence and pleaded for a transformation in which "we could exchange a thousand politicians for even one statesman."

On the subject of international leadership, he said:

"The chief burden of responsibility must rest upon Washington and Paris because the United States and France are the world's outstanding creditor nations and are both economically and psychologically in position to take the lead in repairing this broken world."

"Washington is more particularly to blame because it has not the temptation which besets the French people to remember the fact that their territory had provided the chief battle ground of European wars for several hundred years. The American people have no such excuse to offer."

Blames Leadership

"The inability of our government to lead and the unwillingness of our public opinion to urge in formulating international policies of reconstruction are the chief reasons why the economic and financial crisis is not only prolonged, but why it grows steadily more severe and more alarming."

Dr. Butler is a militant republican and stringent critic of the Hoover administration.

"What our own government has been doing nationally to relieve the depression and restore confidence," he continued, "is exactly like offering smelling salts to a man suffering from incipient tuberculosis. No nation, however great, however vast its resources, or however rich it may once have been, can effect this cure by itself."

Ex-Alderman Subpoenaed For Gang Slaying Inquest

CHICAGO, June 20.—(A.P.)—Thurs. Haffa, former alderman, who was arrested for questioning in connection with the machine gun slaying of George "Red" Barker, labor racketeer and gangster, was released tonight after being served with a subpoena to attend an inquest July 1.

Haffa, who was paroled after spending several months of a two-year term in Leavenworth penitentiary in 1930 for liquor law violations, told police the Haber Die & Tool Works of which he once was president, had never purchased the sub-machine gun found on a lot near where Barker was shot last Thursday.

Officers had traced the weapon by its serial numbers to its makers through the Von Lengerke & Antoline company to the tool works. John W. Shimpson, present president of the latter firm, also denied his company had ever made such a purchase.

Hoover Too Busy To Talk to Manager of Re-election Drive

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(A.P.)—President Hoover today met for the first time since the Chicago convention with Everett Sanders, whom he has charged directly with managing his re-election campaign.

What had been forecast as a conference of wide political importance lasted only a few seconds, however.

The new chairman of the republican national committee reported he had found Hoover "engrossed with his governmental duties" and had only paid his respects.

Saying he had not had time to form plans for the campaign, Sanders reported upon leaving the white house that he hoped to confer with the president during his stay here to close the republican national headquarters in Washington.

Chilean Government Asked To Protect American Property

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 20.—(A.P.)—Ambassador William S. Culbertson formally requested the new socialist government tonight to protect American lives and property at the Braden copper mines at Tentenita against threatened anti-foreign disorders.

Martial law was clamped on the whole country by the governing junta to combat what it described as anarchy festered by "communistic politicians" who were stirring up revolutionary strikes.

The American ambassador said the Braden Copper company, which is American owned, had advised him of agitation and street trouble at Rancagua, including anti-foreign agitation. The company feared the trouble would spread to its mines.

He indicated a belief that the police forces were insufficient to cope with disorders if they broke up. His request for the protection of American lives and property was made in a note sent to the ministers of interior and foreign affairs.

Alabama Delegation to Chicago Said To Be Wet

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 20.—(A.P.)—The Advertiser tomorrow morning will say the Alabama delegation to the democratic convention in Chicago is wet.

The Advertiser says the delegation is divided into three groups, the larger of these favoring repeal, another for a plank for re-submission, and a third for continued enforcement.

DR. BUTLER SAYS POLITICIANS BAR WORLD ADVANCE

URGES U. S. AND FRANCE TO TAKE LEAD

NEW YORK, June 20.—(Associated Press.)—Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler commissioned the United States and France tonight with the responsibility of leading the world from its economic wilderness.

The president of Columbia university spoke at the international mind at the twenty-eighth annual convention of the Advertising Federation of America in the Waldorf Astoria.

He bespoke the immediate necessity of an international conference to reconsider the problems of inter-governmental war obligations, tariff barriers and the monetary system.

He visualized the world's democracies as afflicted with an "infectious disease which may best be described as candidiatitis," and hamstringing with public officials suffering from "political paralysis."

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Two Indictments of Caldwell Dropped

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 20.—(A.P.)—Two indictments charging Rogers Caldwell, former investment banker, with receiving deposits in an insolvent bank were dropped in criminal court today upon motion of the prosecution.

District Attorney General Richard M. Atkinson said efforts to obtain sufficient evidence to go to trial had failed, whereupon Judge Charles Gilbert ordered a nolle prosequi decree entered.

Atkinson explained that, while the indictments are dismissed, it is possible to bring new charges.

ALLEGED ROBBER FREED ON DEATH THREATS PLEA

Chicago Crime Body To Investigate Case

CHICAGO, June 20.—(Associated Press.)—A triple inquiry into alleged intimidation of witnesses against Danny McGeoghegan, gunman and gangster, under indictment for aiding five others in a \$60,000 bank robbery, was planned tonight.

The Chicago crime commission, the "secret six" and State Attorney John A. Swanson said they would investigate action of Assistant State Attorney Walker Butler in moving a hodge podge when the case came up today for retrial.

Butler said Lambert Bere and John Camphouse, officers of the State Bank of Clearing, who had identified McGeoghegan as one of his robbers in 1930, had been "virtual prisoners" under constant police protection for two months and were anxious to return to their duties.

Motion Granted

The prosecutor's motion was granted by Judge John H. Prystalski only after a sharp oral exchange. A jury recently was discharged after deliberating 24 hours without reaching a verdict in McGeoghegan's first trial.

"I don't believe the state attorney should stand here and confess that he is not big enough to keep these witnesses protected," the judge said. "Besides Mr. Bere is big enough to take care of himself."

"Not when he is faced with a machine gun," Butler replied.

"I am not impressed with the reason given for wanting this nolle prosequi, but I yield to your judgment as the prosecuting attorney," Judge Prystalski said.

Bere later said he had never been threatened, except during the robbery, but that a new trial would "be too much trouble and take too much time," and that he was needed at the bank.
