

**TWO MANAGERS NAMED**

**Experienced Executives Are Placed in Charge of Hollywood Hotels.**

HOLLYWOOD, Fla., Sept. 10.—John G. Haydock, prominent Florida hotel man, will manage the new Hollywood Hotel on the beach at Hollywood. Fred B. Shireman, also a hotel executive of wide experience, will manage the Hollywood Inn Hotel.

This announcement came yesterday from J. W. Young, developer of Hollywood, and Charles B. Gehring, advisory director of all the Hollywood hotels. The name of the man who will manage the Boulevard Hotel was not announced.

Haydock started his career at the bottom, as most great hotel executives have done. More than 20 years ago he started as bell boy in the Tremont, Florida and Duval hotels of Jacksonville. From that position he has worked through every department of hotel management.

Last year Mr. Haydock was manager of the Hotel Manhattan at Bradenton, Fla. He has been connected with such hotels as the Leisler, Asheville, N. C.; DeSoto, Savannah, Ga.; George Washington, Washington, Pa.; Royal Yachtman, Palm Beach and for four seasons, manager of the Biltmore, at Balsams, a resort hotel in North Carolina.

During the war, he operated Haydock's restaurant in Jacksonville. He was named by the government as United States food referee over all hotels and restaurants in Duval County. He was also president of the Duval County Dining Hall Association, and later became assistant manager of the Pound system of hotels. He was secretary of the Jacksonville hotel association for several years.

Fred B. Shireman, manager of the Hills Hotel, comes from the Indianapolis Athletic Club, where he was manager for one year. His valuable hotel experience under Thomas Taggart at the famous Grand Hotel in Indianapolis, with whom he served for seven and one-half years.

For more than eight years he was at the Seelbach at Louisville and six years at the Tutewiler, Birmingham. For five years before going to the Indianapolis Athletic Club, Shireman was manager of the Severin, Indianapolis.

Both these men are working on the plans for the opening of the hotels. They have been going over details of the building with Edgar O. Hunter, architect of the Hollywood hotels, so that every detail shall be right.

We are most fortunate to get such men as Mr. Haydock and Mr. Shireman," said Mr. Gehring, advisory director of the hotels. Both know every end of hotel management.

Harry B. Thompson is now manager of the Park View and the Great Southern hotels.

**FOR MONROE MUSEUM**

Residence Where Former President Died Will Be Preserved.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. (AP)—The brick house at Prince and Lafayette streets, in lower Manhattan, where President Monroe died, will be converted into a Monroe museum, it was learned today when Joseph A. Fawcett, an architect, filed plans for placing the building on a new site about 100

feet from its present situation. The house will be completely restored by the Monroe Home Association. Built in 1823 by Samuel J. Gouverneur, a son-in-law of President Monroe, the building recently was purchased by a real estate dealer who planned to demolish it. It was saved from destruction by the association.

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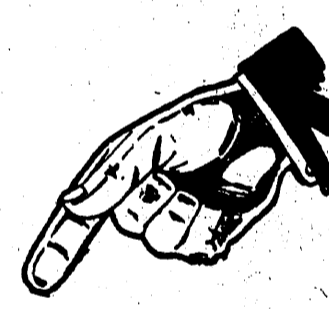
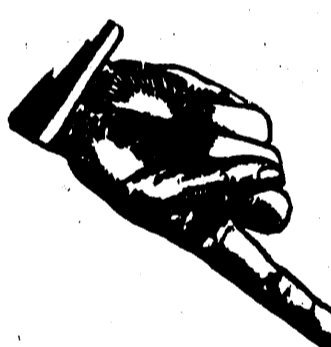
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
