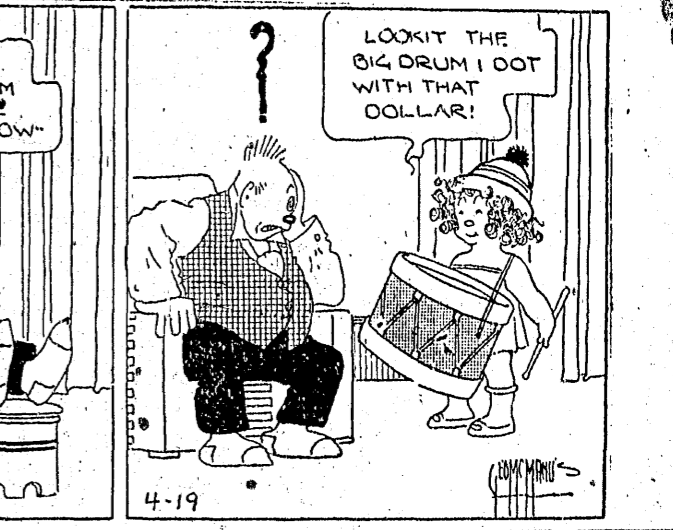
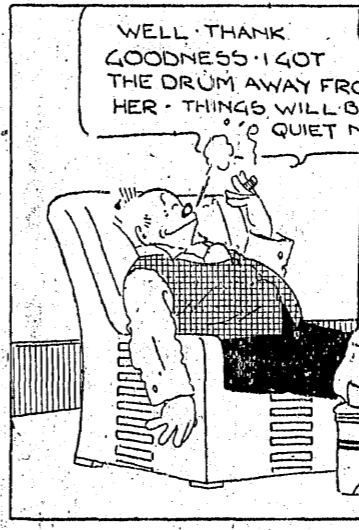

ARCADE WILL BE BUILT

Erection of \$1,000,000 Business and Office Building Announced By Company At St. Petersburg; Postal Receipts Total \$153,248.53 For Three Months; Real Estate Activity Holds Pace.

(HERALD SERVICE.) ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., April 18.—Erection of a 10-story arcade and office building to cost more than \$1,000,000 is planned by the Lawyers' Finance Corporation, a recently organized St. Petersburg institution, according to an announcement. The building will be located on Central avenue and will occupy the site of the Manhattan Market Grocery Company.

Postal receipts during the first three months of the year have totaled \$153,248.53, according to figures recently given out by Roy Hanna, postmaster. This represents an increase of approximately 80 per cent over the highest mark yet to be reached by the department, outside of the Christmas rush, was during March when postal receipts amounted to \$1,416,161.00.

A LARGE six-story bonded warehouse to cost approximately \$250,000, and to serve every purpose, was recently announced for St. Petersburg by the Acme Transfer Company, Inc. It will be located at Fourth avenue and 127 feet facing on the Atlantic Coast Line.

A tract of 83 acres of land located on Gandy boulevard recently brought the highest price ever paid for Florida real estate when the Mariana Land Company of St. Petersburg paid \$1,000 per acre, or a total of \$83,000 for the land.

DESPITE the fact that spring usually sees the crowds waning in St. Petersburg, business here continues good, and there are few indications that any exodus is under way.

Real estate activity has shown little tendency to slump during the past few weeks beyond the January lull. With a general picking up of business of all kinds, leaders of St. Petersburg are of the opinion that conditions are again becoming normal and that the West Coast will come through the period unscathed.

The largest thing that the residents of St. Petersburg are boasting at at present time is the new interurban line that is to link up the city with Tampa, Clearwater, Largo and Pinellas Park.
