

TAX LEVY AT VERO BEACH REDUCED BY ACTION OF CITY COUNCIL

PUBLICITY FUND FIXED

New Twelve and One-Half Millage Rate Will Provide \$160,695.94 For Expenditures During Year; \$30,650 Will Be Obtained From Miscellaneous Sources.

VERO BEACH, Fla., Sept. 17.—The city tax levy of 12 1/2 mills, which is 3 1/2 mills less than last year, was adopted by the Vero Beach City Council today. The new millage contains one-half mill for publicity, which will provide about \$8,000 during the year. All other items being previously fixed, discussion at the meeting centered around the publicity fund.

WARRANTS ISSUED

Escambia County Issues Road Building Certificates. PENNSACOLA, Fla., Sept. 17.—County warrants for the amount of \$150,000 were forwarded this week from the office of County Clerk Langley Bell to Tallahassee, to be used in the execution of the planned scenic highway from the city to the west end of the \$1,000,000 Escambia bridge. There also was an addition of \$40,000 drawn in favor of the state road department to be used in paying the county's share of the expense attached to the construction of the last link of the Palafox highway, which is paved from the northern limits to the city of Pensacola to the Panama line at Blounton, a distance of exactly 13.5 miles. The payment by this county to the department will cover the entire indebtedness incurred in the payment of the long ribbon of concrete. The \$150,000 in county warrants was requested by Chairman Parsons Highway of the state department. Within a few days advertisements asking for bids to pave the nine miles of highway from Pensacola to the Escambia bridge will be placed.

POLK COUNTY MUSIC CENTER IS PROPOSED

LAKELAND, Fla., Sept. 17.—That Polk county and the city of Lakeland can be made a great center of musical culture was the view expressed by Joseph H. Chamberlain of the Lakeland Choral club, in an address before the Civitan club at the regular weekly luncheon meeting. As outlined in his talk, the idea is to organize in Bartow and in Winter Haven choral clubs similar to that organized here in Lakeland, and to gather the three clubs together at stated intervals in each of the three cities for massed concerts.

ROBERTA RISKS IT

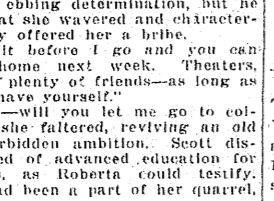

His accomplice, Kenneth Holland of Jacksonville, who pleaded guilty after Barnes was found guilty, was sentenced to 5 years. Both men were on their way this afternoon to Raiford where the state prison farm is located.

BRIDGE PROGRESS MADE

SARASOTA, Fla., Sept. 17.—Rapid progress is being made on the bridge to Siesta Key, and announcement of the opening date may be expected shortly, according to P. E. Schnepf, county highway manager. The bridge is being erected by the General Construction Company, while the American Escalator Bridge Company will install the draw. The total cost of the structure will be \$160,000.

The college, according to officials, this year has the largest enrollment in the history of the institution. About 1,500 will attend, or about 100 over last year. A new \$65,000 dormitory, now being completed, will make available accommodations which were limited during 1925-26.

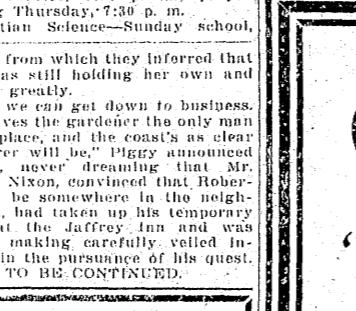

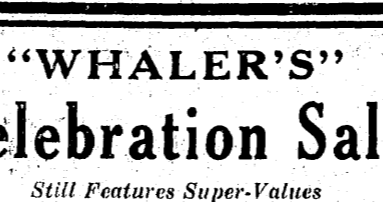

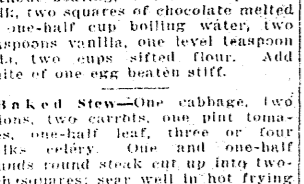

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Baked Stew.—One cabbage, two onions, two carrots, one pint tomato juice, one-half beef or veal stock, one-half onion, one-half carrot, one-half stalk celery. One and one-half pounds round steak cut up into two-inch squares; sear well in hot frying pan. Put into casserole and add salt, pepper, bay leaf and a clove, also the best extract (if you have it). Next add vegetables cut up in small pieces, shredded cabbage and tomatoes. Add enough boiling water to cover the whole, seal, cover and bake in slow oven for four hours. When ready to take out of oven add a little flour which has been mixed to a thin paste with cold water to thicken the gravy slightly.
