

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY TO ISSUE REPORT ON STATE DRIVEN WELLS FURNISH CONSIDERABLE DATA

TALLAHASSEE, July 22.—(Special).—The Florida State Geological Survey has added very much in recent years to the knowledge of what lies beneath the earth's surface in Florida. Especially are the minerals of the earth sought for, and Dr. E. H. Salards, state geologist, says that approximately one hundred million dollars are being used annually by citizens and communities in Florida, in drilling wells. The greater part of this is for water, although some of the wells are test wells for oil and gas, or for minerals.
