The pool system is similar to that used in baseball score pools in the baseball season, but it is somewhat more complicated and it offers a wider range of possibilities for winners and, therefore, a better taking point for those who are selling the chances. Herman F. Rifthoff, chief of police, when informed of the new gaming scheme, said efforts will be made by the police to stop it. He said patrolimen on the districts and policemen on special assignments will be instructed to be on the watch for "salesmen" disposing of the weather report tickets in the same quarters where baseball pool tickets were soid in the summer. The chief said the scheme of gambling on the temperature reports is "a new one on me."

LACH day the temperature for each hour from 6 a, m. to 2 p. m. is published as announced officially by the government weather bureau. The scheme hit on by the pool makers is to compile a number of four digits by taking the last figure of the capital prize for that day. The four-figured numbers next below and above that number are the winners of second prize for that day. An appropriation of \$7,000,000 more will be required from congress. The total cost, with eight generators installed, will be \$45,800,000, and the dam will be capable of producing power some time next summer. A two stage lock for navigation, with a total lift of 93 feet, forms one of the features in connection with the project. He also condemned war and declared Protestants could not lay viaim to having the "purest form of apostolic religion" until they have disposed of "theological disputes and acrimonious controversies."

In referring to the tosks before "God's statesmen." Dr. Cadman said the "first challenge, broadly speaking, is that the light of an undivided church shall shine upon a torn and exhausted world.

"Too many retreat from our Lord's, ideal for the church," he continued, "not because they look upon it as incredible, but as impossible. Nevertheless its fuifillment is inevitable. If He wills her oneness none can withstand His will. Nor hus she a valid title to anything He has not designed her to be.
