

HENRY FORD INJURY ACCEPTED AS ACCIDENT

County Prosecutor Drops Plan of Separate Official Investigation.

 DETROIT, April 2.—Robert M. Toms, county prosecutor, today accepted the report of Ford organization investigators that all their evidence indicated that Henry Ford was injured in an accident and not by design, and abandoned his idea of a separate official investigation.

In response to Mr. Toms' request for information, Harry E. Bennett, chief of the Ford investigators, laid a report before him.

"The investigation was gone about more thoroughly than I could do it," said Mr. Toms. "They had better access to all information, including the statement of Mr. Ford himself, than I could have had, and they had every motive to get at the bottom of the thing."

"I shall assume that they have made an adequate and thorough investigation and I shall accept their finding that it was an accident. To go further would mean merely that I would duplicate their efforts."

In the familiar surroundings of his home estate, the world's richest man was making satisfactory progress toward recovery today, according to a brief statement of Dr. Roy D. McClure, surgeon in chief of the Henry Ford hospital, who is attending Mr. Ford.

The automobile manufacturer was injured last Sunday night when the Ford coupe in which he was riding was sideswiped and forced down an embankment at the river Rouge bridge near the entrance of his estate.

INSURANCE MAN TAKES HIS LIFE

Sends Bullet Into Brain In Jacksonville Apartment.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April 2.—Robert E. Currier, 42, state agent for a fire insurance company, was found dead in his apartment here early today by Edward Haynes, business associate, who shared the apartment. Haynes went to Currier's room to investigate a revolver shot.

Though no assignable motive has been found, officers stated that suicide was so apparent as to render an inquest unlikely.

Currier went to a baseball game with friends yesterday and was said to have been in the best of spirits. Business associates know of no financial difficulties. He was to have been married in May to a Jacksonville society girl whose name has been withheld. His wife, to whom he had been married 14 years, died 14 months ago.

Death resulted from a revolver bullet wound in the temple. The gun was found on the bed beside the body, which was still clothed in pajamas. The body will be sent to Currier's former home in Black Mountain, N. C.

About five years ago a young lawyer, fresh from the University of Florida, came to Okeechobee and because he could play baseball as well as argue a case, Sheriff Collins took him in tow and insisted on him becoming a part of the city life.

The people in that county believe in him and he believes in Okeechobee. He and Senator Jennings will support that plan strongly in the coming session, but each has declared that if a better plan can be offered, they will support that as readily, as their greatest hope is for Everglades drainage.

NO SIGNS OF BOMB IN BOAT EXPLOSIONS

Coast Guard Officials Apparently Disregard Theory of a Plot.

 MOBILE, Ala., April 2.—Coast guard officials are making small headway in working on the theory that a league of rum runners, working in co-operation at different bases, are attempting to destroy coast guard cutters and patrol boats as rapidly as they are supplied to the Gulf division. Capt. H. Wolfe said today. The investigation now under way for some time was occasioned by the recent explosions aboard the CG-28 at Key West and the patrol boat Bullet, at Biloxi. Both vessels were badly damaged, the Bullet being practically destroyed and sent to the bottom of Barataria bay, in Louisiana.

The investigating board appointed to go into the explosion aboard the Bullet, in which five men, including the commander of the Biloxi base, were in peril of death, at first entertained the theory that a time bomb may have been planted in the engine compartment. The stern of the vessel was completely blown out and other apparent evidence indicated that conclusion. But a closer examination of the vessel, which is now being rebuilt on the ways in Pascagoula, showed that this was not so, as no localized effects of the explosion, such as would have been seen in a bomb explosion, were found.

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WAGE ARBITRATION IS AGREED UPON

Southeastern Railroads and Firemen Come To Understanding.

WASHINGTON, April 2. (AP)—The southeastern railroads and their firemen have agreed to arbitrate their wage increase controversy, the United States Railway Mediation board announced today.

Following meetings between representatives of the railroads and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen the two groups have each selected a member of an arbitration board, and these two in turn will choose a neutral member at a conference on April 5.

The railroads selected as their representative Vice President J. W. Jenks of the Norfolk and Western railway and the firemen Vice President C. J. Goss of the Brotherhood. The firemen are seeking an increase of \$1 a day in wages.

The announcement of the arbitration agreement, made by G. Wallace W. Hanger, a member of the mediation board, said that if the two groups' representatives fail to name a neutral arbitrator next Tuesday the board will make the selection.

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DEMAND PUNISHMENT FOR MEXICAN KILLERS

U. S. Officials Act On Murder of American Who Was Kidnaped.

 MEXICO CITY, April 2. Arrest and punishment of the murderers of Edgar Marks Wilkins, an American

who was kidnaped, held for \$20,000 ransom last week and then killed, was asked of the Mexican government by the United States embassy, today.

Wilkins was from Savannah, Ga., but long had been a resident of Mexico. The embassy communicated with the foreign office after Dudley G. Dwyer, the United States consul at Guadalajara, had officially notified the embassy that Wilkins' body had been found in the hills near that city.

It was presumed that Wilkins was murdered Monday when a federal troops, sent to rescue the American, encountered the kidnapers but failed to capture any of them or to release Wilkins. Wilkins twice had been kid-

naped before without injury. With his son, Wilkins was kidnaped last week and the boy was sent back by the kidnapers carrying their demand for ransom.

RITCHIE CANDIDACY URGED IN MARYLAND

ANNAPOLIS, Md., April 2. (AP)—With Republicans from three counties moving to suspend the rules to clear the way for it, the Maryland house of delegates today unanimously adopted a joint resolution asking Governor Ritchie to announce his candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination. The resolution was adopted by the senate last night.
